One's mind tends to wander when sitting in a quiet blind.

Well, it wasn't really a blind, it was hidden - as much as one can be with a hunter orange cap and jacket - amongst a tangled clump of silverberry shrubs on a pasture knoll during a warm, near mid-November late afternoon. Pheasants cackled somewhere in the background. Waves of snow geese and lesser Canada geese creased the sky.

While the deer rut activity was increasing, on that particular afternoon they must have decided they would wait until the dark hours to be up and about because they were as quiet as the beautiful North Dakota day.

But that's OK because it provides opportunities to relax and just let one's mind wander; musing about past mid-November outdoor experiences and reflecting on the abundant opportunities afforded here:

Hmm, it seems there was one year when the weather was just like the day sitting in the silverberry, only this time instead of silverberry it was wearing the same orange cap and jacket trying to appear as nothing but a weird colored rock among buckbrush. Being a shorter shrub than silverberry it's harder to hide. But it was easy to soak up the

to drag a buck out of a U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service Waterfowl Production Area (WPA - they're open to all legal hunting seasons) through knee-deep snow while it's still snowing provided a reminder of just how different each deer gun season can be.

Bundled up in warm layers of clothing with the advantage of walking to keep even warmer, the idea was to head out for what, given weather conditions, would likely be the last opportunity before the season closed a few days later.

One shot and I had my deer. But that's where the challenge began. Even the hilltops had more than a foot of snow and I had about onehalf mile between me with my fielddressed deer and the vehicle. It was a slow, slow drag but as darkness set in my husband realized I wasn't along the prairie trail bordering the

He had been sitting in a blind (hmm, much more weather protection than my walk) about 4 miles away. Being prepared, we had taken a sled along "just in case". Also, thankfully, we were in an area with wireless reception so I could describe the direction the deer and I were slowly coming from, and he met me with the sled for a much easier exit.

The other thing one tends to think of when it's a beautiful, calm mid-November day is that it seems a vast majority of light geese wait and lesser Canada geese wait until the North Dakota deer gun season is on before they start their major migration southbound.

Living in west-central North

Dakota, we get to experience the heart of Central Flyway migration, especially along the Missouri River System. The air almost echoes with their cackling and honking. It's a treasure to observe and a major waterfowl hunting opportunity.

Sometimes the geese will stay, resting, loafing, and feeding for the strength to travel yet another 1,000plus miles. Other time weather dictates they continue arduously onward to the south with conditions like that deer season with a deer on a snow-laden WPA.

The "big" geese - giant Canada geese, though, will stay for as long as Mother Nature dictates, which means late-season waterfowl opportunities as well as the opportunity to watch the hardy birds on the Missouri River and open water of Lake Sakakwea.

And then there are those taunting pheasants one hears while sitting among the quietness of that mid-November afternoon. It seems they know there's a rifle in hand and no one is carrying a shotgun with an eager Brittany in the lead, nose busily scenting their presence.

So they can cackle and crow away, taunting.

Maybe the quiet afternoon in the silverberry shrubs atop a pasture knoll wasn't so quiet after all. It was busy with memories, smiles, and silent laughter.

More than anything, it was busy with the appreciation of the opportunities afforded someone taking the time to soak up the true outdoor experience.
