He was transported to Feist Funeral Home in Wishek. Family members, including his parents, two uncles, a close friend and DiVenere, were at the scene throughout the recovery effort, Delzer


According to the State Forensic Examiner's Office, no autopsy will be performed since Hendricks death was a witnessed drowning with no foul play suspected. Therefore, no exact cause of death has been determined

Since the area is part of a federal waterfowl production area, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service personnel were also involved in the operation. Other agencies assisting in the recovery included the McIntosh County Sheriff's office, Wishek Police Department, N.D. Highway Patrol and N.D. Game and Fish Department.

Delzer was highly complimentary of all the agencies and individuals involved, stating "absolutely everyone on the scene played an important role in successfully recovering Hendricks' body."

Dakota Valley Electric Cooperative (DVEC) is seeking applications for the \$1,000 Basin Electric Power Cooperative (BEPC) scholarship to a high school senior who will be enrolling in a full-time undergraduate course of study at an accredited college or vocational/technical school in the fall of 2026

Now in its 35th year, the scholarship program is funded by DVEC's power supplier, Basin Electric Power Cooperative.

Applicants must be high school seniors enrolled or planning to enroll in a full-time course of study at an accredited two-year or four-year college, university or vocational/technical school in the fall of 2026. In addition, applicants must be U.S. citizens and dependents of a DVEC member.

Scholarships will be awarded regardless of financial needs, or other awards or scholarships a student may receive.

The winning recipient will be selected based on academic record; SAT/ ACT scores; leadership and participation in school and community activities; honors; work experience; a personal statement of career goal; and a written recommendation by a third party.

Applicants must also write an essay describing, "How does the electricity provided by your electric cooperative improve the quality of life in your community?"

All applications must be postmarked or returned to DVEC by Jan. 31, 2026. The winner will be announced after March 1, 2026.

Ever heard about Franksgiving?

In 1863, President Lincoln designated Thanksgiving as a national holiday to be held on the last Thursday of November.

But in 1939, to boost Christmas shopping during the Great Depression, President Franklin Roosevelt moved Thanksgiving up a weekfrom November 30 to November

Some states refused to go along with the change, creating two different Thanksgivings in 1939 and 1940. Congress finally settled the matter in 1941 by passing a law declaring Thanksgiving to be the fourth Thursday in November (not necessarily the last).

Many newspapers jokingly referred to the early date between 1939 and 1941 as "Franksgiving."



Tim Flakoll, who has served as a Midwestern Higher Education Compact (MHEC) commissioner for more than 20 years, received the Phillip Sirotkin Award during MHEC's annual meeting, held in Cleveland, OH, November 6-8.

Phillip Sirotkin was the early visionary behind the regional higher education compact in the Midwest. MHEC established the honor in his name in 1999 and periodically confers the award upon individuals who have been voted upon by the entire MHEC commission.

"Tim has demonstrated an unwavering commitment to higher education and students across the Midwest," said MHEC President Susan Heegaard. "He played a key role in North Dakota becoming the second state to join the State Authorization Reciprocity Agreement, which increases student access. He also has been a tireless advocate for open educational resources and has drawn on his experience as a North Dakota legislator to offer valuable insight for higher education policy. Receiving MHEC's highest award is a testament to Tim's outstanding contributions and leadership."

In accepting the award, Flakoll reflected on his journey from a young boy who was indifferent to school to his decades as a passionate higher education advocate. "I wish my mother and father were here to see me receive this award," he said. "When I was a college freshman, I told my mother I wasn't sure I was going to make it,

and she simply said to me, 'Tim, do the best you can.' I have tried to live by those words."

Flakoll grew up in Forbes, ND, and currently lives in Fargo, where he serves on the Cass County Commission. He was a member of the North Dakota State Senate from 1998–2016. He served on the Senate Education committee for 18 years and was vicechairman and chair from 2012-2016. He also served as provost for Tri-College University of Fargo-Moorhead and was named provost emeritus by North Dakota State University in 2024. He served as MHEC chair (2017–18), vice chair (2016–2017), and past chair (2018–2019).

ing Assets, Reducing Risks) program. Wagner provided an update on the transition from Be Legendary to Student First Governance. Discussion was held. The board received an update on the School Construction Project, which remains behind schedule. While summer delays were due to rain, current setbacks are primarily related to coordinating subcontractors and securing their presence on-site. Additionally, NDSC has completed a safety assessment of the facility and practices, with adjustments now being implemented to improve overall safety protocols.

Conferences are set for October 15, with early dismissal at 1:00 p.m. She provided an update on Behavioral Health services and the first meeting with South Country Human Services.
