Amendment of Chapter 14 OAKES Revised Ordinances Amendment of Section

14.0206 Traffic Visibility WE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF OAKES, NORTH DAKOTA, do hereby amend Chapter 14 by amending section 14.0206 to read as follows:

14.0206 Traffic Visibility In any district, no fence, structure, or plantings shall be erected or main-

tained that interfere with traffic visibility

across a corner.

In any district, without first obtaining a variance or conditional use permit. which may be denied in the discretion of the City Council, the following limitations shall apply: no fence shall be erected or maintained that is greater

than six (6) feet in height. Setbacks established by this chapter shall be applicable to structures other than fences and this section shall apply to fences
