



Memory Lane

100 years ago
Emilia Kandt sustained a broken nose and three others escaped injury when the Ford coupe in which the four were riding overturned in Denhoff Tuesday evening. The young people were on their way to a dance in McClusky when the accident occurred. They continued on their way to McClusky, where Miss Kandt received medical attention.'

A prairie fire in Boone district near Goodrich on Monday evening aroused considerable excitement in the neighborhood but did no serious damage. Farmers of the district turned out in numbers soon enough to prevent the blaze from spreading and doing more damage.

Sam Frank, farmer near Skogmo, purchased a quarter of land recently for which he paid cash. The amount involved in the transaction was not made known. Mr. Frank now owns 640 acres of land, all debt free.
Mr. Frank came to North Dakota in 1903 with "not enough money to buy a shingle," as he put it. The first purchase he made was a pick handle and crowbar, which were needed to clear his farm of rocks.

75 years ago
Sheridan county's farm to market road program will be greatly curtailed in the next two years because the proposed 5 mill levy for secondary roads failed to carry in the

last two elections. The special levy was rejected in the general election by a vote of 1062 to 730.

Boone School No. 4, in Boone district north of Goodrich, probably has the distinction of being the only rural school in Sheridan County that publishes a paper.

Following the suggestion of the Young Citizens' league of the school, John Keller, teacher, last week forwarded a copy of the November 15 issue to the Gazette. It is a mimeographed sheet of regulation typewriter size, printed on one side and issued once a month.

Robert Weber heads the staff as editor-in-chief. Other staff members include Doris Hagen, assistant editor; Lois Frueh, business manager; Wallace Andeson, staff artist; Larry Frueh, YCL notes; James Wolfe, grade news; and Mr. Keller, advisor.

The November 15 issue had for its main story a report of a successful carnival sponsored by the school. Gross proceeds amounted to \$106.76, and the net proceeds, \$87.76, which were used to buy a piano for the school.

Winners of the 1975 Soil Conservation Achievement Award for Sheridan County, Mr. And Mrs. Clifford Dockter, were honored at the annual Sheridan County Soil Conservation District banquet at Holy Family Catholic Church in McClusky November 18.

The McClusky Baptist Church will be having a dedication service for the new parsonage Sunday, Nov. 30, at 2:30 p.m. Reverend Clarence Walth, the area Secretary, will be the special speaker for the occasion.

The project began when the church decided to purchase the William Lasher property approximately a year ago. The old house was sold and torn down last winter to make way for the new building.

tive authority, for the grant of presidential powers is lean and meager, particularly when compared to the capacious powers vested in Congress. The principal problem lies, rather, in the unwillingness of the men and women in positions of power, those at the helm, duly to perform their duties and responsibilities. And, it should be emphasized, if the constitutional arrangement were deficient, its violation by the president could hardly be justified in a nation which exalts the rule of law, a principle that requires executive subordination to the Constitution and

the laws of the nation. If the constitutional design is perceived to be inadequate, then the Amendatory Clause—Article V—supplies a remedy: Change the fundamental law and render it appropriate to the needs of the nation.

If constitutional change is not the remedy to restore a constitutional presidency, then, we ask, what is? Thus, we begin in this column in the weeks ahead our journey to return to Ithaca.

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
