The Hettinger City Council met in regular session at the Hettinger Armory Conference Room with the following present, James Lindquist, David Parrill, Michele Gaylord, Randy Burwick, and Carl Ebert
Mayor Lindquist called the meeting to order at 7:00 AM
DECEMBER 11, 2024 MINUTES Council Member Gaylord moved to approve the minutes of the regular scheduled meeting. Second by Council Member Ebert and by unanimous vote, motion carried.
DECEMBER 23, 2024 MINUTES Council Member Burwick moved to approve the minutes of the special meeting. Second by Council Member Gaylord and by unanimous vote, motion carried.

AGENDA: Council Member Parrill moved to approve the agenda as amended. Second by Council Member Gaylord and by unanimous vote, motion carried.
FINANCIAL STATEMENT: Was Reviewed, Council Member Gaylord moved to approve the financials, second by Council Member Parrill, and by unanimous vote, motion carried.
NATHAN NAGEL: met with the Council to give updates. All water meters, even commercial, have been installed. The Street sign by the old Carmel Cleaners building should be taken down. Discussion by the Council was had on complaints on street cleaning that have come in, discussion was had on procedures for snow removal around commercial businesses for safety and emergency situations.
HHS AFTER PROM: Alison Skogen met with the Council to discuss an application that was submitted for sales tax funds for the after-prom party this year, the request is for \$2k.
CORRESPONDENCE: A thank you from Liz Hallen for working together on the sale of the KMM building. Time tracking has been completed and ended at the end of the year. Mayor Lindquist will try and get the data compiled in the next month or so.
MAYOR/COUNCIL REPORTING: Council Member Gaylord discussed the Armory building was used for an emergency shelter after the multiple vehicle accident by Reeder in December. Several items will need to be purchased. The Armory generator is up and running, and the gym light switches have been

moved. Mayor Lindquist shared that the 10 turkeys have been removed by the NDGF. The help may not be allowed the next time due to the amount of food left out for stray cats and birds in town. Mayor Lindquist worked with Brad Guthrie and Brad Robinson as well as Trish Schalesky, on items to be completed this year for both ADA requirements as well as common upgrades
ARMORY MAINTENANCE CUSTODIAN: Trish Schalesky met with the Council to update them on the Armory and the fitness center. This month's fitness center memberships were \$2,049.00. A phone was purchased for use and the snow blower was purchased and ready to use. Another phone jack will need to be added to have access to the phone in her office. Discussion was had on getting a keypad access to the electrical closet, this project could be completed by Brad's this winter.
SALES TAX REPORT: Was reviewed, the report shows the funds collected in 2024 are down \$10k from 2023.

JAY SKAARVOLD RESIDENCE: no fines were assessed to the Skaarvold family. The house has been removed. Part of the original approval for the mobile home was to have updated brick look skirting. Jay and Marilyn Skaarvold visited with the Council on the skirting, and the issues with the upgrades. Council Member Gaylord moved to approve finalizing the Skaarvold permit with waiving penalties established in November and waiving the updated skirting requirement, second by Council Member Parrill, and by unanimous vote; motion carried.
ACDC/CHAMBER DIRECTOR: Rebecca Ferderer met with the Council to discuss both Chamber and ACDC meetings. ACDC updated their bylaws and still need to be approved by the County Commission. Discussion was had on the banner project, showcasing banners by different businesses. A summit on growing hemp will be attended by a few Hettinger citizens. A couple Chamber updates were also shared. Discussion was had on how to go about the shared cost of the KMM building, as ACDC owes \$135k for their half of the building. Discussion was had on options for the Main Street building, and when sold, adding the right of first refusal back on the deed again. Several grant opportunities were discussed.

ALBERT KELLER AND ANDY ROEHL: met with the Council briefly to discuss the possible expansion of the Graphic Art business, possibly into the KMM building. The two would like to provide a business plan to show their plan and how they would utilize the entire space. Mayor Lindquist discussed with the two, that they should work closely with ACDC for working on a business plan.
BENJAMIN BOYLL: met with the Council to discuss ideas he has on the KMM building. He owns the Boom Closet gun shop in Mott and was interested in moving his business to Hettinger, and thought if the building was partitioned off, he would be interested but would not need the entire space.
SHERIFF JORDAN FISHER: met with the Council to discuss a couple items. Sheriff Fisher is looking into a new reporting system. The system would allow the city ordinances to be added to the system. Discussion was had on the current system, any citations within the City, all funds are collected for the State, and no funds go back to the City. With adding the city ordinances, any citation money collected would be split out, to allow the city to get a percentage of penalties back. Council Member Burwick moved to approve Sheriff Fisher to proceed with the addition of the ordinances in his system, second by Council Member Parrill, and by unanimous vote; motion carried. Sheriff Fisher gave his end of year report on calls of service for the City of Hettinger. Sheriff Fisher was proud to announce that his department is fully staffed, after the newly hired,

Derek Marsh.
TED UECKER: met with the Council and shared his position with WRHS and shared his commitment and his feelings of pride in our local medical services. Mr. Uecker also discussed his requests for Sales Tax funds and inform them of upcoming events planned, such as Giving Hearts Day. This year donations can be made via credit card, but people are still able to provide donations via check as well. Mr. Uecker requested the city declare a proclamation for Giving Hearts Day as February 13, 2025. A Giving Hearts truckload sale at Kennedy's is planned. Giving Hearts night in Scranton during a boys' basketball game. Hettinger School Board was interested but there were not any home games to utilize around the February 13 date. Mr. Uecker was hoping the Council would allow a donation from Sales tax funds to either or both "Grateful Givers" or "Giving Hearts" campaigns. Mr. Uecker discussed the "Grateful Giver" campaign funds actual medical equipment needed that exceeds what WRHS can budget for. Mr. Uecker discussed an upgrade and revamp to the Obstetrics wing as a major project he would like to see happen at WRHS.
Council Member Parrill moved to approve and adopt the Proclamation of Giving Hearts Day as February 13, 2025, second by Council Member Gaylord, and by unanimous vote; motion carried.
Mayor Lindquist declared February 13th as Giving Hearts Day with the following proclamation:

IN OBSERVANCE OF "GIVING HEARTS DAY" on February 13, 2025 in Hettinger ND
Whereas, in 2008, Giving Hearts Day was created by the Dakota Medical Foundation and the Impact Foundation as the first one-day "virtual" fundraising event of its kind in the region; and
Whereas, the goals of Giving Hearts Day are to raise awareness of the charitable nonprofit sector and its organizations in North Dakota and western Minnesota, to assist the organizations in better telling their mission stories, to promote online giving, and to provide donors the opportunity to multiply the results of their giving; and
Whereas, this 24-hour online fundraising event is dedicated to inspiring online donations for charities at givingheartsonline.org; and
Whereas, Giving Hearts Day is powerful because it inspires so many to give for the first time or to contribute to newly-discovered charities; and
Whereas, the charitable nonprofit sector provides much needed services that improve the quality of life for so many in our community; and
Whereas, the charitable nonprofit sector supports individuals and families with quality programs, materials and funds that promote and encourage self-sufficiency; and
Whereas, all the above listed benefits serve to strengthen the fiber of community and make it richer for all residents; and
Whereas, in order to provide the benefits, charities who provide these services need ongoing funds in order to provide long term sustainable services for our residents in need; and
Whereas, these charities have demonstrated a need for collaboration and resources, and have joined together for this one day online fundraiser;

Now, Therefore, I, James Lindquist, Mayor of Hettinger, ND do hereby declare February 13, 2025 as GIVING HEARTS DAY IN HETTINGER ND, and call upon public officials, business and Community leaders, and educators, and encourage all Hettinger citizens to observe this day with appropriate ceremonies, activities, and programs in order to:
