



investigation may still grow. He said that while students at Davies have been the focus of the investigation, students at several schools are believed to have been involved.

"Matters like this have a way of blossoming, not withering," Wrigley said.

The attorney general said he was aware the investigation was causing significant anxiety at the schools and for students and parents, and that there were "delicate mental health issues to be dealt with." He said the parameters of the BCI probe did not include consenting, interpersonal messages.

"There are young people who are ... making decisions about creating an image and sharing with a boyfriend or what have you. Understand that is *not* what this

investigation is about. Those are not the fruits that we are going to take out and present to the prosecuting authorities in this matter. Those are not of interest to the investigation," Wrigley said.

He also sought to assuage the concerns for some of those whose phones may have been collected as part of the warrant, explaining that some had already been returned.

"I do want to stress that just because someone's phone was seized as part of this investigation does not in and of itself mean they committed a crime. Their phones were listed in the search warrant in some instances because it was clear from the information we got from Snapchat that they had *received* these materials," Wrigley said.

He said students who had simply received the images would not be subject to charges, but "the

challenges come" for those who shared the images or participated in harassing victims. He cautioned anyone characterizing that conduct as simple childhood "pranks."

"There's nothing funny about it," Wrigley said. "It is illegal. It is detectable. And when it gets into the hands of law enforcement, we have the responsibility to pursue it."

**Next steps**

Wrigley said he did not have a specific timeline for when charges might be filed, but that among the state statutes being investigated are the unlawful creation, possession and dissemination of sexually expressive images; promoting and directing an obscene sexual performance by a minor; promoting obscenity to minors; terrorizing; simple assault; and conspiracy.

"When the time is

right we will be turning over the fruits of our investigation to the Cass County State's Attorney's Office," for decisions, Wrigley said. "Some number of these students are adults. They have reached the age of 18. Some significant number of them are juveniles ... those matters will be sorted out by the state's attorney's office."

He thanked the Fargo and West Fargo police, as well as the Cass County Sheriff's Office, for assisting with the investigation.

A spokesperson for the state's attorney's office previously declined to comment on the investigation.

A social media app, Snapchat is known for allowing its users to display temporary photos and videos to friends, which then disappear after they are viewed. "Delete is our default," according to Snapchat's online support page.

The nonprofit Child Rescue Coalition says parents should understand Snapchat's format, since the disappearing messages can encourage risky behavior, including sending nude or semi-nude photos.

Snapchat's community guidelines prohibit using the app for illegal activity, including child sex abuse or exploitation imagery, and it is a crime to disseminate images of people depicted in a sexual act in North Dakota and Minnesota.

Under North Dakota Century Code, disseminating obscene material is a Class C felony, including sending explicit material to another person. In Minnesota, the crime is considered a gross misdemeanor unless children younger than 15 are involved, in which case felony charges may be filed.
