Starting May 1st, 2025, through October 1st, 2025. Steele City employees will check any grass heights they may think that exceed six inches. If found to be in violation of this ordinance Steele City employees will cause the nuisance to be abated. The cost of the abatement will be the responsibility of the person responsible for the property.


