## New State Superintendent emphasizes rural schools, and community connection

North Dakota’s new State Superintendent of Public Instruction, Levi Bachmeier, is beginning his tenure with a focus that resonates strongly in rural communities like Velva, listening to local voices, supporting small school districts, and preparing students for life beyond graduation while keeping communities strong.

Bachmeier was appointed by Governor Kelly Armstrong in October 2025 and officially took office on November 24th, 2025, following the resignation of longtime Superintendent Kirsten Baesler. He will serve through the remainder of the current term and has announced his plans to run in the 2026 statewide election.

One of Bachmeier’s first stated priorities is to visit every school district in North Dakota, including rural and small-town districts. That commitment is especially meaningful for communities like Velva, where schools often serve as the heart of the community and play a

critical role in the workforce development, and long-term population stability. Keeping true to his promise, he visited Velva Public School this past Friday and engaged with students with their questions and concerns. One of the hot topics was school districts moving towards a four-day week. Surprisingly, most students were against this idea, questioning the role this will play on demographics in our area and how that change would play out in today’s parents’ work week.

A native of West Fargo, Bachmeier brings both classroom and administrative experience to his new role. He began his career as a high school social studies teacher and coach, teaching at Crazy Horse School on the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation in South Dakota. He has said that his time in the classroom continues to inform his understanding of what educators and students need to succeed.

As State Superintendent, Bachmeier now leads the North Dakota Department of Public Instruction, which oversees public and nonpublic K-12 education across the state,



as well as institutions such as the North Dakota School for the Deaf, the School for the Blind, the center for Distance Education, as well as the State Library. Bachmeier has modeled his vision around ensuring students are “Choice Ready” – prepared for college, career, military service, or immediate entry into

the workforce. For Velva and the surrounding communities, that approach aligns with the importance of career and technical education, agriculture-related fields, health-care, skilled trades, and entrepreneurship. While also supporting students who choose to pursue higher education fields.
