

# Forage Matters: Springtime Is Go Time

Several years ago, I wrote a column with the same headline. Weather conditions at that time were ideal, with favorable soil moisture and temperatures. Spring was in the air. Optimism for the coming spring and growing season was high.

This year, my feeling is a little different. While I have been in North Dakota a short time (March 1 marked my four-year anniversary in the state) I know that this winter was unusual. A grower told me shortly after I came to North Dakota that this country needs snow. While

parts of the state saw significant snowfall, the winter has been mostly open. I do look forward to spring, warmer temperatures and a new growing season, but I am apprehensive about how good this growing season will be.

North Dakota State University Extension just released an excellent news release written by Miranda Meehan, livestock environmental stewardship specialist, and Kevin Sedivec, rangeland management specialist, on the upcoming grazing and haying season ([ndsu.edu/ag/extension/outlook26](https://www.ndsu.edu/ag/extension/outlook26)). In this release, they provide several scenarios based on moisture received during the fall

and spring, as well as the effect of grazing intensity during the fall of 2025 on 2026 forage production.

If we do experience a year with below-normal precipitation and above-normal temperatures, are you prepared? A large emphasis on the 2026 forage production outlook is placed on fall 2025 grazing management. If there are pasture and range areas that were grazed the previous fall to the point that developing tillers were consumed and limited leaf area remained before frost, these areas should be rested this spring to allow for plant recovery. Being prepared for unfavorable growing conditions is a management strategy for every year.

Texas famously experienced drought conditions from 1949 to 1954. A summary of conditions affecting the recovery, "The Effect of the 1949-1954 Drought on the Ranges of Texas" by Vernon A. Young, was published in 1956. The following is a quote from their summary:

"In general, ranges that were properly managed before and during the drought came through in fair to good condition; overstocked ranges were severely damaged and subsequent recovery has been limited. Thus ranchmen have evidence for the need for carrying out proper management practices year after year, not only to meet drought periods, but to build an economic unit by capitalizing on the years of favorable moisture. Thus the old rule still prevails that close grazing does not pay."

These words from 70 years ago are still true today.

Are you prepared? As we move into spring, look back on past grazing management and anticipate how that will affect forage production moving forward. There are several

monitoring tools and information sources available that can help refine how this year is shaping up: NDSU Extension, North Dakota Natural Resources Conservation Service, North Dakota Agricultural Weather Network, National Drought Mitigation Center (home of the U.S. Drought Monitor), and Climate Prediction Center. Burn restrictions and fire danger maps can be found at [ndresponse.gov](https://ndresponse.gov).

Unfavorable growing conditions this year can create plant stresses, leading to concerns about forage availability factors that need to be addressed. Nitrate can accumulate in plants that undergo periods of rapid growth followed by slow growth. Dry weather conditions can increase the risk for prussic acid accumulation in sorghums. Be aware of the potential for these conditions to develop, and test as needed. Monitor animal health and body condition during tough grazing times. Have a dry-weather response plan in place that includes a well-thought-out destocking plan if necessary.

Extended dry weather conditions can reduce plant vigor, leading to plant death. This often results in desirable plants being replaced by less desirable ones, such as an increase in Kentucky bluegrass. Practice good grazing management year in and year out to maintain healthy plants and healthy root systems, so when we do encounter dry years, the grazing resource is preserved.

Springtime is go time: cows calving, breeding season underway, crops being planted and cattle being turned onto grass. Hopefully, we will experience knee-high grass with abundant water resources in 2026. Even if we do, it still pays to practice good grazing management as insurance for those years when we don't.

# Dakota Datebook: A Birthday For The CCC

It's no secret that the thirties were a difficult time. As people watched their crops fail and their lives become struggles, there was a general outcry for improved conditions.

FDR was inaugurated as President on March 3, 1933, and by the end of the month, on March 31, he signed into law an emergency employment act. A few days later, under this act, the Emergency Conservation Work agency was established. Its goal was to relieve unemployment and to aid in restoring the natural resources of the land. This eventually became the Civilian Conservation Corp.

In 1937, North Dakota was designated as a district of the CCC program. The year prior to that, North Dakota was considered to be a sub-district of Minnesota and was placed under the supervision of Fort Snelling. Under this new designation, fifteen officers and twelve civilians were stationed at Fort Lincoln, supervising their new district.

At this time, there were 6,500 North Dakota boys enrolled in the

CCC, with two "veteran" programs in Fargo and Mandan, and nine "junior" companies, at Kensal, Foxholm, Kenmare, Mohall, Kramer, Kelvin, Larimore, Watford City, and Medora, all which now fell under the new headquarters of Fort Lincoln. Coincidentally, the company out of Sidney, Montana, also fell under the newly created North Dakota district.

So, in 1937, the North Dakota companies of the CCC had plans underway to celebrate their fourth birthday. The twelve camps in the North Dakota district were set to show a variety of programs to the general public. It was estimated that 20,000 people from North Dakota and parts of Montana would attend these various shows.

The litany of events included special programs, tours, open houses, and more. In Mohall, the orchestra of Company 765 was set to play music throughout the day of the celebration. In Kramer, there was free cake and ice cream with the promise of a free movie. Foxholm planned on hosting a free lunch. So did Medora, along with an athletic tournament. Kenmare's company got special permission to delay their celebration, since bad roads and conflicting dates caused some problems. They planned a dance and special program for later in the month.

The CCC provided many families with opportunities they otherwise wouldn't have had... and so it was a sweet birthday for all involved.

# North Dakota Game And Fish News

## Caution Urged Near Bridge Project on Missouri River

The North Dakota Game and Fish Department, under U.S. Coast Guard authority, has created an idle speed only and navigational safety zone near an ongoing bridge construction project on the Missouri River.

With spring's early ice out, March 30 will mark the start of an idle speed only area and a navigation channel through the Burlington Northern Sante Fe Railroad bridge project. The navigational channel will be marked with green and red floating buoys to direct the public to the navigable area through the construction zone. The navigational channel will change locations when phase two of the construction season starts, which is anticipated to be sometime in June.

Additionally, the project area will be marked with multiple types of lighted floating buoys and encloses an area from the west bank north of the project staging area, to the east bank, and then following the east bank south approximately 1,500 feet and back to the river's west bank.

The "No Boats" buoys are located north and south of the active construction barges and have yellow flashing lights for nighttime visibility. The solid, white light "Idle Speed Only" buoys indicate where the idle speed zone starts and operate day and night.

The cautions are in place to protect people and boat traffic during the construction project and operate during the open water months on the Missouri River near Bismarck-Mandan. Also, river users operating paddlecraft, such as canoes and kayaks, are encouraged to exit the river upstream or downstream of the navigational safety zone.

A violation of the regulatory buoys is subject to a fine under North Dakota Administrative Code.

## Advisory Board Meetings Announced

The North Dakota Game and Fish Department Advisory Board will host public meetings this spring at eight locations across the state.

These public meetings provide citizens with an opportunity to discuss fish and wildlife issues and ask questions of their district advisors and agency personnel.

## New State Record Yellow Perch

A 3-pound yellow perch caught

March 1 by Wisconsin angler Alan Hintz is the new state record, according to North Dakota Game and Fish Department personnel.

Hintz caught the 16.5-inch perch through the ice in the Pelican Bay area on Devils Lake.

The previous record of 2 pounds, 15 ounces, also from Devils Lake, was set in 1982 by Kyle Smith of Carrington.

## Whooping Crane Migration

Whooping cranes are migrating and sightings will increase as they make their way through North Dakota over the next several weeks. Anyone seeing these endangered birds as they move through the state should report sightings so the birds can be tracked.

The whooping cranes that do travel through North Dakota are part of a population of about 550 birds on their way from wintering grounds in Aransas National Wildlife Refuge in Texas.

Whoopers stand about 5 feet tall and have a wingspan of about 7 feet from tip to tip. They are bright white with black wing tips, visible only when the wings are outspread. In flight, they extend their long necks, while their long, slender legs extend behind the tail. Whooping cranes typically migrate singly, or in groups of two to three birds, and may be associated with sandhill cranes.

Other white birds such as snow geese, swans and egrets are often mistaken for whooping cranes. The most common misidentification is pelicans, because their wingspan is similar and they tuck their pouch in flight, leaving a silhouette similar to a crane when viewed from below.

Anyone sighting whoopers should not disturb them, but record the date, time, location and the birds' activity. Observers should also look for and report colored bands, which may occur on one or both legs. Whooping cranes have been marked with colored leg bands to help determine their identity.

Whooping crane sightings should be reported to U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service offices at Lostwood, 701-848-2466; Audubon, 701-442-5474; the North Dakota Game and Fish Department in Bismarck, 701-328-6300; or to local game wardens across the state. Reports help biologists locate important whooping crane habitat areas, monitor marked birds, determine survival and population numbers, and identify times and migration routes.

# 'Games Of Pembina's Past' Program Scheduled At Pembina State Museum

Shuffle your way into the past at the Pembina State Museum during "Games of Pembina's Past: Faro and Frontier Gambling" on Saturday, April 18. Drop in anytime between 1 and 4 p.m. to learn how to play faro, a popular and fast-paced game of chance from Pembina's frontier days. The event is free and open to the public. Children must be accompanied by an adult.

First played in France in the 1600s, faro spread to England by the 1700s and reached the United States in the 1800s, where it quickly became one of the country's most popular gambling games. Between 1825 and 1915, it was played in nearly every saloon across the American West. Site interpreters will be

available in the museum lobby with a replica faro set to teach the game to visitors.

This family-friendly event is part of the ND250 commemoration celebrating our country's 250th birthday.

The Pembina State Museum, located at 805 Highway 59, Pembina, is managed by the State Historical Society of North Dakota. 
