

Parking restrictions lifted at school

The Elgin City Council rescinded a decision to restrict parking near the school and shared election information during the council’s regular meeting Feb. 5.

Last month, the council approved restricting parking during school hours on West Street North. Parking was not going to be allowed along the east side of the street across from the school, beginning at the parking lot entrance and extending to an alley north of the school. That area includes about nine parking spaces that would have been left open during school hours to alleviate traffic congestion when buses load and unload.

Buses currently park on the west side of the street, which creates a narrow opening on the street.

Following complaints about last month’s decision, the council reversed its decision last week, but had a conversation with Superintendent Dr.

Sherlock Hirning, who attended the meeting, about traffic congestion on that street.

“Just changing the motion or previous action of the board doesn’t still solve the problem,” Hirning said.

“There was really a lot of backlash,” Mayor Ron Bartz said.

Following an accident at the school in which a student was struck by a vehicle in 2024, the council lowered the speed limit to 10 miles an hour on West Street North and the school started placing a portable sign at the intersection with First Avenue between the two crosswalks.

Maneuvering around the portable sign requires driving on the opposite side of the street, said council member Ron Fischer, who also drives bus.

That sign could be moved to a better location, Hirning said.

Buses not driving down the bus line also creates a problem, as one bus might still be waiting for students and other buses pull out of the bus line to depart.

“In all reality, it should be when the first one takes off, you

follow along,” Fischer said. “That’s the way it should be done in all reality.”

Following the bus line would solve the problem best, Bartz said.

“To me, that’s the only way you’re going to solve it, so they can all leave straight up, but they have to be a little patient,” he said.

Parents parking in the middle of the street awaiting their children also create traffic congestion and cause children to walk in-between the buses to the waiting car, Fischer said.

“It’s a chaotic mess,” he said.

The council asked the school to consider having parents pick up children in the back of the school rather than street side.

Fischer indicated parking situations arose in the back of the school as well when that was allowed.

“It certainly does deserve some attention to see what we can figure out,” Hirning said.

Election information shared

The mayoral position and three

council seats will be on the June 9 ballot, and candidates must file the proper forms by 4 p.m. April 6 to appear on the ballot.

The current mayor is Ron Bartz and council seats up for election are currently held by Kristian Roth, Ron Fischer and Brian Richardson. Forms are available from the city auditor’s office. The positions are at large for four-year terms.

In other business:

•The city attorney shared an opinion that the Elgin golf course could request a special event permit to serve liquor at the clubhouse outside of its regular permit dates of May 1 through Oct. 31.

•A water usage report indicated the city had 916,880 unaccounted gallons for 2025, compared to 1,549,800 in 2024. Community center use, flushing hydrants and fire department training are not metered uses of water.

The 2025 financial recap showed \$9,789 revenue over expenses, with an ending balance of \$1,047,864.

HISTORIC BRIDGE AVAILABLE FOR ADOPTION AND PUBLIC INPUT SOUGHT

Grant County, in cooperation with the North Dakota Department of Transportation and Federal Highway Administration, is proposing work on one bridge along 52nd Ave SW, south-southwest of St. Gertrude, ND. The Project Number is BRJ-0019(026); NDDOT # 23711.

1) Bridge 19-131-47.0 is a single-span, Warren, pony truss bridge constructed in the 1920s and relocated to the current location between 1957 and 1970. It is approximately 82 feet long and 21 ft wide (curb to curb). The bridge crosses Cedar Creek approximately 16 miles south and 6 miles west of St. Gertrude, ND. This bridge will be removed and replaced with a new bridge. Since this bridge is listed in the National Register of Historical Places, FHWA has determined that its removal constitutes an Adverse Effect on it, and for the project as well. Hence, public comment is sought on both of these Adverse Effect determinations.

Further, since this historic bridge could be relocated while maintaining historic integrity, it must be offered for adoption to any responsible state, local, or private entity willing to take over, relocate, and preserve the bridge at a new location (23 U.S.C. 144). Any entity willing to “adopt” the bridge would have to agree to maintain it and assume all future legal and financial liability, as well as liability for the structural integrity and safe use of the structure. The bridge needs to be relocated prior to road closure work, scheduled to begin in the 2026 construction season.
