

# Minutes of Napoleon City Council

## City Council Monthly Meeting Monday, February 2nd, 2026 Napoleon City Hall 7:30 p.m. (Subject to council review and approval)

Mayor Moos called the regular meeting to order. Alderman present: Rod Kleppe, Rich Bjerklie, Bob Humann, John Wald, Clark Haas and Mike Heying.

Pledge of Allegiance was recited by all.

Additions to the agenda – Remove #7 under new business, meeting by Hoberg, Hoberg not ready; Special Assessments on city lots purchased; payloader.

No public comments received.

Wald motioned to approve the minutes from January 7th, 2026, meeting, Heying seconded, motion carried.

Kleppe motioned to approve the financial report as presented, Bjerklie seconded, motion carried.

Grant Dockter from Moore Engineering sent in the Engineer's Report. The city has been awarded the Prairie Dog grant to complete street rehabilitation. The grant is for 50% of the total project, 1.3M, but funds won't be available until 2027. No action items are due at this time, more information to come.

**STREETS:** Received three bids for chip sealing, will address at next meeting after checking into financing for the project and advertising requirements for the project.

Mayor Moos informed the council that the new tar kettle is here, and he will be checking it out on Tuesday. Haas said that a sand and salt mixture is needed for the city next year for the winter. A truck load is all the city would need for the year. Northern, from the McKenzie pit, would have some available for purchase. Haas also said that it should be covered so the city should think about maybe adding something onto the recycling building where this mixture could be stored and also the garbage truck during the spring and summer months.

**GARBAGE:** Wald informed the council that the garbage truck needs a new radiator. After reviewing the estimate, the council decided to go ahead with the new radiator.

Kleppe motioned to pay all bills as presented. Humann seconded, motion carried.

Bill from Leona Kuhn, which was tabled last month has been paid.

**ZONING PERMITS:** Chris Iszler – propane tank; The George Co. LLC-replace windows, moving walls in building; Nick Breidenbach-temporary portable storage containers. Kleppe motioned to approve all permits, Hass seconded, motion carried.

Wald motioned to approve the gaming permit for Logan County 4-H Council to have a raffle, Heying seconded, motion carried.

City Sales Tax request was pulled for approval due to the business not interested in the loan.

Humann reported on the information received from City Attorney Hanson on unfit properties. Humann received the information late so didn't have a lot of time to go over it. Humann said it is a very complex issue so the council should take the information provided and look it over and bring their thoughts on this matter to the next meeting.

Humann also informed the council on the conversations he had with surrounding towns on the Renaissance Program. Kleppe also said he talked with a city involved in the program and they felt that it was not a good fit for Napoleon and to keep doing what we have been doing cause our city has done a great job with projects. Humann stated that he feels the City Sales Tax Committee and the JDA have done a great job with keeping up on projects within the city and said he is making a motion not to enter into the Renaissance Program, Haas seconded, all hands raised in

favor of the motion, motion carried.
