PASTORS NOTES Pastor Ed Zimmerman

Biblical commandments have for thousands of years been a source of controversy. People have at times memorized the commandments, but ability to quote law is arguably not the difficult part.

Doing the law is more difficult, and some argue it to be impossible. But correctly understanding what the law requires can be a very significant challenge.

Religious leaders and influencers throughout history have held differing views. Moses delivered the commandments and then spent (maybe daily, along with specially selected assistants) hour listening to people's problems and explaining how the law applied to their daily practical issues.

During Jesus' physical ministry on earth the various religious specialists held differing interpretations of how to understand and apply the commandments. And Jesus sometimes proposed corrections to their understanding.

The Pastor's Notes today is limited in time or space sufficient to do no more than introduce the issue. The purpose here is only to encourage openness to listening to a broad range of views and opinions. It is helpful in general matters relating to our lives and relationship. It is helpful also importantly regarding religious or spiritual matters like the ultimate meaning of

commandments. Like, what does the law actually demand? And, how does the law relate to the gospel?
