

got his electricity for free. On one occasion while inspecting the lights he was not paying attention to where he was going and ended up in the town dam.

Without electricity there was no refrigeration, so homes and meat markets relied on ice for cooling perishable products. In January or February when the ice got thick enough on the local dam, the city dray man or delivery man would hire men and go out and harvest the ice from the dam. They would saw the ice into 18-inch square blocks, load it on sleds and transport it to the town "ice house." There it was packed in sawdust and would stay frozen for most of the year. When homeowners and businesses needed ice, the dray man would deliver it to them for a small fee.

The grain elevators used one-cylinder gas engines to power their equipment. During the busy season these engines, having a distinctive plunk-a-plunka-plunk sound, ran tirelessly as the harvest was brought to town.

Nearly every farmer milked some cows. When the milk was collected, it was ran through a cream sep-

arator. The cream not used at home was taken to the depot in cream cans to be shipped out on the train going east. Most went to the Mandan Creamery in Mandan, ND. The morning eastbound passenger train #8 was always the cream train. It came through town fairly early and sometimes the farmers did not get their cream on that day's train. It would sit in the depot until the next day. When the weather got warm, the cream in the cans would "boil over," causing a big mess for the agent to clean up. It also had a tendency to spoil one's appetite for fresh butter

for awhile. Sentinel Butte was not incorporated as a village until 1913, over 30 years after it became a railroad station. It was incorporated after an election on April 24, 1913.

The first village

trustees were Harve Robinson, C.D. Rouse and W.A. Hart.

Unfortunately, the town's prosperity was fairly short-lived. There were a number of problems that hastened the decline of the town. Homesteads were only 160 acres and the yields of grain were not high enough to support families here. Successive years of drought also severely impacted farming in the area. Most farmers went broke with their credit also running out.

At that time, Beach and Golva were growing rapidly and shrunk the trade area that Sentinel Butte depended on for survival. One by one the businesses went under and people moved on to start over again somewhere new.

This story has repeated itself many times over the years as our country went through the growing pains to become who and what we are today.
