(continued from page B1) planted a huge, beautiful grove of trees on the west and north side of his yard. Great wind protection. Martin was married to Ida Nelson and they had nine children. Martin died on March 26, 1929. Ida died Sept. 6, 1955. Their son LuAllen took over the farm and lived there until his death. The big house and farmstead are still there in great shape and are owned and lived in now by Ron and Lori Keller.

Anton Hovland was the next brother to immigrate to America. His trip over was a little different as he first went to Halifax, Nova Scotia in 1894, then to North Dakota the same year. He worked on various farms until 1903 when he homesteaded in Fram Township, three miles east of Wellsburg on the hill above the Shevenne River. This farm is 111 years old. He built a big house exactly like Martin's and a huge farmstead with a large grove of trees on the south, west and north sides. Anton never married and died on June 7, 1950. After Anton's death, his nephew Norris Hovland acquired the farm and the house and farmstead are still in great shape and are lived on.

The next brother to immigrate to America was my grandfather, Severin Hovland. He was 17 years old and went through Ellis Island, then to Stony Brook Township to work for his future father-in-law, Nils Vigen. Severin married Nils's daughter Clara on Nov. 23, 1905. She is my grandmother. The newlyweds then left Stony Brook Township and homesteaded on a farm in East Fork Township, Benson County, and lived there until

1909 when they built a large farmstead in Fram Township, Wells County, a few feet from the Benson County line. This is the farm I grew up on. He, too, planted lots of trees and there was a huge grove of them on the north, west and south side of the yard. And there was a huge barn. The house was small, but larger than the one he grew up in, in Norway.

Severin and Clara had eight kids, one of them being my dad, Elmer. Severin died on July 10, 1960 and Clara died on Feb. 8, 1941. My dad, Elmer, lived on this farm and farmed it all his life except for the years he served our country in World War II. The farmstead is still there and in great shape. The house was expanded in 1959 and then again in the 80s. The big beautiful barn blew down in a windstorm several years ago. There are still people living on the farm.

A little Hovland family trivia info: Severin and his dad Johannes both had birthdays on August 16. My son Kelsey and I share birthdays on August 9. A wonderful coincidence.

I believe the brothers Reinert, Matt and Christ all immigrated to America together or in the same timeframe. They entered through Ellis Island, more than likely went to Stony Brook Township, then to Plentywood, Mont., but I don't know the year.

Reinert and Christ lived together, and Matt lived a quartermile away. They shared the same well. Reinert and Christ never married but Matt did and I believe his heirs still live on the land.

The brother who stayed in

Norway, Johannes, was much younger than his older brothers and didn't know them very well. John and Martin came to America a year before Johannes was even born!

So in 1950 his brothers treated him to a trip to the USA. He took a ship to New York and from there went to Chicago where he met several of his brothers. Johannes was in America visiting for six months.

There are hundreds of stories throughout North Dakota like the Hovland brothers' story. People who came here on the dream of a better life. The Scandinavians who settled the east side of the state and the Germans, Russians, Polish and other Europeans who settled the west side. All of them came here to become Americans. They worked hard, adapted, persevered, and relied not only on themselves but each other to

achieve their dreams. And they were successful! They not only made a better life for themselves but also for their descendants. I know my life is better because of the accomplishments and the foundations set forth by my grandparents.



White House as a sous chef during President Clinton's tenure. She was appointed executive chef by First Lady Laura Bush in 2005. As a Filipino American, Comerford became the first Asian American White House Executive Chef, as well as the first minority and first woman ever to serve in the position.

Katherine Sui Fun Cheung: Cheung came to the US from China intending to pursue a career in music, but she fell in love with aviation. She worked toward obtaining a pilot's license, which she eventually earned, becoming the first Chinese woman to be granted one in the United States. She was inducted into the Aviation Hall of Fame for her long career of doing tricks like barrel rolls, dives, loops, and even flying upside down.

· Philip Vera Cruz: Vera Cruz, who was of Filipino heritage, was a labor organizer and farm worker. He was integral in founding the United Farm Workers Union, and is best known for his role in the Delano Farmworkers strike and boycott.

· Celeste Ng: A Chinese American author, Ng explored the complex concepts of race and gender in a Chinese American family in her debut novel "Everything I Never Told You." Her second novel became a Hulu miniseries, and Ng remains one of the world's bestselling authors
