Masons donate to Fargo Memorial Honor Guard

FARGO, N.D. — The Masons of North Dakota recently awarded a \$100,000 grant to the Fargo Memorial Honor Guard in Fargo according to Winton Wold, chairman of the North Dakota Masonic Foundation.

The grant is being used to help achieve the goal of \$1.5 million that is the estimated cost of building a chapel and family facility at the Fargo National Cemetery located in rural Harwood, North Dakota. The Fargo Memorial Honor Guard is planning to purchase land and construct a place to gather, reminisce and relax.

The Fargo National Cemetery originally contained only five acres, but through the efforts of U.S. Sen. John Hoeven, R-N.D., it has been expanded to 35 acres. It does not qualify for any funding from the Veterans Administration.

The veterans group is seeking to raise \$4.5 million for their project to purchase land adjacent to the Fargo National Cemetery, construct a building to house a chapel, a space for veterans' families to gather before or following their loved one's internment, a break room for the veteran volunteers with a secure safe for the Honor Guard

to store their weapons, restrooms and a utility storage room. The building will also

include space for a military museum showcase, a listing of the interments and an office for a manager/curator, Excess funds will go into an endowment fund to ensure future sustainability.

According to Jason Hicks, a member of the Fargo Memorial Honor Guard, "The goal is to not only create an attractive setting that will be visited by the traveling public across the state, but to ultimately memorialize all of the veterans resting in the cemetery. The Fargo Memorial Honor Guard is determined to provide shelter for religious, non-denominational and patriotic activities for veterans and their families during the military honors ceremonies at the the Fargo National Cemetery."

"This gift is a part of the Mason's Community Charitable Grant program," according to Winton Wold, who also recognized the 41 Masonic Lodge across the state as being highly instrumental in the development of the Masonic Foundations program of charitable giving. Wold went on to say that "Without the Lodges, this wouldn't be happening."


