Landowners asked to keep rights-of-way clear of snow

The ND Department of Transportation reminds landowners not to push snow into the right-of-way or ditches on state highways. This includes the roadway, ditch bottom and backslope of the roadway. Proposals sought for Lohnes Township art

Arts Across the Prairie (AAP) is a first-of-its-kind. statewide creative placemaking program developed by ND Council of the Arts (NDCA). Eight large-scale art installations will be created that reflect the unique history, landscape and cultural heritage as defined by stakeholder groups in each of these regions. All eight artworks will be placed in decidedly rural locations. The art installations will reference and represent the natural setting, as well as the cultural and economic history of each region.

Each of the eight installations will be selected through a request for proposals (RFP) process which includes two phases with separate application deadlines.

The first phase is a request for qualifications (RFQ) from artists and/or creative teams. During the second phase, the top three candidates will be asked to submit proposals. The RFP process has been completed in Regions 1, 2, 4, 6 and 8 with artists selected and installation plans in development. Region 3 begins with this request for qualifications announcement.

Region 3: Heart of the Land, Spirit of Unity

There are eight distinct regions in North Dakota. Region is comprised of Benson, Cavalier, Eddy, Ransom, Rolette and Towner counties. Regional and local leaders from business, arts, education and communities were recruited as stakeholders to guide the development of one artwork and site to be the artistic, historical and cultural representation for the eight counties. Since early 2024, the stakeholders have met to plan the sixth statewide Arts Across the Prairie project. They selected as their project's subtheme the phrase "Heart of the Land, Spirit of Unity."

Stakeholders visited many sites, looking for one that could capture it all -- the water, the farming and diverse landscape, both tribal nations. Ultimately, they selected a site in central Lohnes Township (47°56'55.2"N 98°42'53.8"W). It looks onto immediate surroundings of small watering holes, pastureland and cropland. Looking west, the land slowly drops, offering a stunning vista with Devil's Heart Butte in the distance.

Vision: Heart of the Land, Spirit of Unity

The vision is for a permanent large-scale art installation, and the finalist's proposals should reflect their affection for and attention to place. Rural communities/residents will be living with the artwork for a long time, perhaps generations. The selection process for this project will also require the finalist's ability to teach and share with others as future North Dakota artists are trained in the outdoor installation process.

Who's eligible, timeline

Artists must live in North Dakota, or tribal reservations in South Dakota, Minnesota, Montana, southern Manitoba and/or southern Saskatchewan. Those with long-standing commitment to or history with these lands and communities may also be considered.

An artist or creative team may apply, although the total fee for the project will not change. Ideally, one would be an established artist with experience in large-scale outdoor installations and public art and familiarity with placemaking, community work and teaching.

The initial submission of materials deadline is Thursday, Jan. 15, 2026. From the submitted applications, only three finalists will be selected to submit project proposals. The selection committee will announce the artist/creative team for the Region 3: Heart of the Land, Spirit of Unity, art project at the end
