For “C.J.” Buck, 2 1/2 year old son of Mrs. Donald Buck, all’s well that ends well even

if it includes being away from home and on his own more than three hours. Tuesday of last week, “C.J.” (his name is really Chakiris John) and his dog Charlie, a basset hound, decided to take a walk. The walk took them away from the home of Mrs. Buck’s parents, the Lawrence Buck farm. Walking over the open fields, the boy and dog went, others not knowing where. They were missed about 1:30 p.m. and so Mrs. Buck notified the Emmons County sheriff’s office. More than 40 people of the Hazelton area joined in a search effort, organized by the Hazelton Fire Department, and they combed the countryside. Because the Buck farm is on Highway 83, there was some fear that a passing motorist may have picked up the boy. “C.J.” was wearing warm clothes on a cold and rainy day, and so his adventure wasn’t terribly uncomfortable. Eventually a group of teenage boys found the dog on the William Brindle farmyard a mile and a half from the Buck farm. The boys reported back to the sheriff. On their way back to the farm where the dog had been found, they learned via the sheriff’s radio that a group of school girls, also searching, had found “C.J.” standing on a haystack. the little guy was no worse for the wear and tear of three hours out. He ate some cherry pie, then had a long, long sleep.
