The USDA Service Center in Ellendale is open and operations have returned to normal after the federal government shutdown. That means that SCD staff have moved back from the Ol' Nursery in Oakes to the office in Ellendale. While we had an extremely productive fall at the Ol' Nursery, we are glad to have access to needed files to complete our tree planning for 2026!

If you have a scheduled tree plan for 2026, be on the lookout for your tree planting agreement and finalized plan coming in the mail. If any changes need to be made, please let us know asap because tree ordering has started.

Also, if you had a tree planting completed in 2025, we will be sending out a notice reminding you of the opportunity to order replacements for any dead trees. Take advantage of the reduced rate for replacement trees - it is only valid the first year after planting! You must let us know if you want the replacement trees ordered - they will not

be ordered automatically, and we cannot guarantee extra stock availability in the spring.

Do you have a seeding that needs to be completed in the dormant seeding window? Now is the time to order your seed and get it planted! The ground temperature is in the needed range. As a reminder, the SCD office can order your seed if you would like. It typically gets delivered to Ellendale and we have the grass drills available for rent.

What does winter bring for our office you may wonder? A lot of planning, programming, and training! SCD staff will be busy planning our annual Ladies Ag event for the spring. We have programming in the local schools. Training includes winter meetings like our annual convention held in Bismarck and the SCD employee statewide training held in March. There are other smaller opportunities around the state that come up throughout the winter and we are always eager to learn for cohorts in other areas. As time allows, we plan activities/lesson plans ahead so they are available to us more readily if a request for programming comes in while we are busy

with other tasks. We also do site visits for future tree plantings if the weather cooperates. It seems as if there is never a dull moment!

# **Protect Your Flock and Herd:** Bird Flu Prevention and **Protection**

**NDSU Extension Hosts** Statewide Educational Sessions on Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza (HPAI)

FARGO, N.D. - Producers across North Dakota will have the opportunity to learn practical, on-the-ground strategies to keep their operations healthy this December through a series of five, in-person sessions led by Dr. Jake Galbreath, NDSU Extension Veterinarian.

As Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza (HPAI) continues to impact poultry and dairy operations across the region, North Dakota farmers and ranchers remain on high alert.

"Recent detections of bird flu in wild birds and domestic poultry underscore the importance of strong biosecurity practices and timely reporting," said Dr. Galbreath. "These educational sessions aim to equip both commercial producers and backyard flock owners with science-based guidance to reduce risk and protect their operations." About the Sessions


