McLean County Sheriff's Department calls for service Oct. 12 - 25

Oct. 12

Deputies performed a traffic stop at about 1 a.m. at the intersection of U.S. Highway 83 and N.D. Highway 200. Nathaniel Seglin, 42, of Hazen, was arrested for driving under the influence.

Oct. 14

Deputies performed a traffic stop at about 5:30 p.m. in the alley in Turtle Lake. Upon pulling the vehicle over for expired plates, the driver gave consent to search the vehicle. Jesse Anderson, 40, of Turtle Lake, was arrested for driving with a suspended license.

Oct. 15

Deputies responded at about 7:15 p.m. to the 318th Avenue Northeast near Wilton to assist another agency.

A reporting party stated they were passing through the area east of Wilton when they noticed a vehicle that had rolled over about 300 yards from the shooting range. It was reported between three and four males were involved and was walking towards the city of Wilton. Once first responders arrived, all individuals refused medical aid.

Oct. 16

Deputies responded at about 8:30 p.m. to U.S. Highway 83 near mile marker 131 on a report of a vehicle versus deer crash, which disabled the vehicle. Due to the location of the crash with the animal on the roadway, deputies called in fire to assist at the scene for traffic control while they worked to get the deer and debris off the roadway. Occupants in the vehicle sought medical treatment.

Huesers, White Owl sentenced in individual cases

Two defendants were sentenced in their respective cases through District 28 court in McLean County.

Huesers

Stuart Huesers, born 1964, of Garrison, pleaded guilty Sept. 17 to criminal mischief – willful – tamper – intentional \$2,000 to \$10,000, which is a Class C felony.

Huesers, who was represented by court-appointed Attorney Omid Kardoust, was sentenced to one year in the department of corrections and rehabilitation with 275 days suspended for 18 months of supervised probation with credit for one day served. In addition, it was noted 89 days will be served by electronic home monitoring, and Huesers was ordered to pay \$525 in fees and fines with \$500 waived.

According to an affidavit prepared by McLean County Sheriff's Det. Aaron Matties, which was obtained through District Court 28 through a public records request, during an interview March 31, Matties was told Huesers broke out the headlights of a victim's vehicle after a dispute with a third party in early January.

Due to the headlight having a special LED chip, Matties found the value of the headlights to be \$1,207.33 per headlight with the core

charge for each light at \$50 and a control module valued at \$419.22 for a total of \$2,967.70.

During an interview Jan. 8 between Garrison Police Officer Brighton Smith and Huesers, Huesers admitted to breaking the victim's headlights on his vehicle.

"Smith stated in his report that Stuart Huesers broke the headlights with a hammer because (the victim) owed him \$150," the affidavit stated.

White Owl

Payton White Owl, born 1997, pleaded guilty May 7 to possession of a controlled substance – second offense and possession of drug paraphernalia, both of which are classified as Class C felonies.
