Interviews - Hiring -Chicken Ordinance to be drawn up

The Glen Ullin City Council was held last Monday evening with all members present except Wade Kottre. Other guests were Sid White who is the city's emergency manager and Deputy Wehrung.
The consent agenda was approved and included:
The approval of the regular monthly meeting minutes from October 13, 2025 and a special meeting from October 29, 2025; the October financial report; purchasing and installation of a sensor from Amber Waves for the cost of \$420; and the October bills presented.
The zoning of the property at 311 Ash Avenue West was discussed. The issue of turning the church into apartments was brought before the planning and zoning board recently. The board recommended the change from R-1 a single family to R-3 multi-family property for a 3-plex family apartment building. The council after discussion recommended and approved the change and up to three apartments to be constructed from church building. They were concerned with parking but there is enough room for parking in the rear (north) part of the lot for a 6 vehicle parking lot. The zoning change was approved and the property owner will be notified.
The low water pressure was discussed at 315 D Street South. Glasser Excavation will camera the water line and see what should be done.
Sid White Glen Ullin Emergency Manager gave an update on the emergency trailer and looking into the contents of the trailer and see what needs to be updated and take an inventory of the contents. White brought a quote for radios to replace the radios the emergency department

has and that they are out dated and should be replaced. The cost is from \$2,500 for a hand held radio and \$5,000 for the hand held, and base with all accessories. No action was taken at present.
Chickens within the city was discussed at length and the council agreed that they will draw up an ordinance and that will be placed on the election ballot in the upcoming June, 2026 election.
Wednesday, November 12 was the deadline for that. Those that have chickens, to have them gone, since it is illegal to have them in the first place.
Vicki Horst, city auditor gave an update on the updates on the Blue Room renovations. The painting is done, the bathroom stalls have been put up with the exception of one on order to be here in the next couple of weeks, the plumber has put the toilets, urinals, and sinks in, the electrician has to return for the final items he has to complete and the contractor has a few things to do to complete is part of the project. The Blue Room will get cleaned up and get put to use. The rent for the Blue Room has been \$45 but the council approved raising the rent to \$100.
The dumpster that is located at the compost site was discussed. Many are dumping stuff there that should not be put there and belongs in the landfill. When the city knows who dumps things there illegally they do send bills out to those people. It cost the city extra every time stuff is dumped there and the city guys have to transfer it to the landfill, so people why not just take it there in the first place.

The Glen Ullin School District #48 held its meeting last Wednesday evening with members, Chasity Wood, Jill Feser, Andrew Jacobson, Landon Hoff and Mitchell Bettenhausen present. Absent were Matt Morman and Tony Sifuentes. Others present were Superintendent Martin Bratrud, Principal Todd Hetler, Business Manager Kayla Schumacher, Maintenance supervisor Preseton Foss, teachers Alice Fitterer and Amora Wheeler, Nikki Wetzel of Dakota Community and Trust in Glen Ullin explained the advantages of CD, Money Market and Savings comparisons.
After president Jill Feser called the meeting to order, the group said the Pledge of Allegiance and then right into Student Outcome Goals presnted by Superintendent Martin Bratrud. He explained the scoring

and how the students are doing in Reading and Math. Overall scoring outcome was average. Bratrud said there are places to improve and some nice scores where the outcome score could be moved higher.
