change. Langley had requested the county conduct a stream crossing study to determine whether the existing stream crossing meets state standards, but the county rejected that request late last year.

He was instead told that he could hire a private land surveyor to conduct a study at his own expense, and that's exactly what he did.

According to a drainage report conducted by Daniel V. Fischer of Fischer Land Surveying & Engineering, "the current configuration of Eddy County Road No. 4 has changed the natural drainage pattern."

Fischer's report also notes that the area only has a slope of 0-2%, which contributes to the slow drainage, but ultimately concludes that changes should be made to culverts near Langley's property.

"The culverts in the two field approaches should be removed to return the drainage pattern to original conditions before the man-made ditch on the west side of Co. Rd. 4 changed the drainage pattern, and a culvert should be installed ... under Eddy Co. Rd.

4," states the drainage report. After acquiring this report, Langley also retained J. Bruce Gibbens of Gibbens Law Of-County Commission suggesting the county follow through drainage report.

"Eddy County has a duty under [N.D. Century Code] to construct the road and ditches so that the water follows the natural course according to the original surface and his letter.

"The construction by Eddy County of the west ditch has altered the natural flow of the water and allowed it to flow south flooding acreage owned by my client."

ney Ashley Lies wrote a letter signaling a willingness to consider the proposed changes, but only if several conditions

are met first. However, she also argues in the letter that making the proposed changes - namely removing two existing culverts and adding a new one to allow for better drainage - would only benefit Langley himself, and not other landowners in the area.

"Per Fischer's own report, the current crossing meets the required standards set forth in the North Dakota Century Code and the North Dakota Administrative code," states Lies in her response. "To allow the proposed changes your client is requesting would only benefit him."

She also adds that the county's engineer - Interstate Engineering, Inc. - is "not sure" if there would even be any drainage improvements accomplished by adding the culvert under Eddy County

Nevertheless, she says there are actions Langley could take to potentially sway the county's position.

"The County is not completely unwilling to consider these changes but more information is necessary to evaluate its impacts to neighboring landowners," states Lies, who goes on to list several actions fice out of Cando, N.D., who the county would require wrote a letter to the Eddy Langley to take. possible impacts on wetlands. "Once all of this information is obtained and found acceptable by the county, the county would then require easements from impacted landowners to help assure acceptance with the proposed improvements," states Lies in

her response. As of press time on Oct. 16, the county had not yet received a response to Lies'

Langley, meanwhile, told the Transcript that it appears he and the county are at an impasse. However, he is waiting for a response from his attorney before determining what further action he may take.

The accepted bid was for a new 2025 Chevy Collins 14-passenger yellow school bus, costing the district \$99,900.

The bus will have a 2025 or newer chassis, a 6.6L gas engine with a block heater and hydraulic brakes, among several other comfort and safety features.
