commission that he would be absent for the November meeting. Paul White and Wells Mc-Griffert were present to give an update on the Flickertail Wind Project. PRC is continuing to do outreach, have hosted two open houses, and continue to use feedback in the engineering and design work. Permitting is moving forward with getting the permits to townships first that have their own Zoning. Road use agreements are underway, working on consistent87 plan. Field studies

continue, along with field work. Lisa Thompson, Emergency Manager and Michelle Gilley, Extension Agent were present to discuss a farm mapping system, RFDASH. Rural Firefighters Delivering Agricultural Safety and Health is a program related to training first responders, designed to reduce agriculture injuries and property loss and to promote health and safety within the agriculture sector. Part of the program includes a mapping system, that will need information inputted into it. Emergency Managers and the Extension Agent are going to be tasked with mappings, mailings, and farm visits to obtain the information (with permission from landowners), that will be inputted into the program.

Dave Gehrtz made a motion to move forward with this program for Eddy County. Glenda Collier seconded the motion. All were in favor, motion carried.

Lisa Thompson discussed SNAP benefits and the possibility of needing an Emergency Dec

laration due to the government shutdown. Great Plains Food Bank is will be dropping approximately 175 boxes of nonperishable food items in Fessenden, for a distribution on November 10th. If the shutdown continues there may be a need for an Emergency Declaration. Thompson reported that the BIA had requested that a reverse 911 call to all residents be sent out, asking for everyone to keep an eye out for a missing individual. The process was not successfully distributed to those in our area. Thompson will continue to work on improving the list and the process in efforts to make a more successful distribu-

Michelle Gilley, Extension Gilley reported that with the government shut down, the process is at a standstill. Gilley is working on asking for members to join the Fair Board. Gilley will be writing an article for newspaper advising the public that board members are being sought for the new fair board. It was discussed that a 5-member board would be ideal.

Julie Shrock, VSO director advised the commission that all records for VSO office are now digital. Shrock will be advertising for transportation needs to help facilitate veteran travel for appointments. Shrock then requested she be able to work remotely in her position as VSO director.
