The highest scorer must get the recommendation of the committee. If fewer than 3 proposals are re-ceived, a new RFQ may be published, the applicants may be inter-viewed, or the District may consider using another delivery method. If a

CMaR selected for the project declines the appointment or is unable to reach an agreement with the District, the District must terminate the negotiations with the first candidate and start negotiations with the next highest scoring candidate, repeating the process, if necessary, until an agreement is reached. If the list of finalists is exhausted, the District must request the selection committee to revise the RFQ and solicit new submissions. If the selection committee is unable to provide any con-structive revision to the RFQ, the District shall select another project deliv-ery method other than CMaR.
