The Nome Schoolhouse

Many of us use digital media products such as Facebook. One of the founders of that company is Mark Zuckerberg, a name grown familiar as one of the young billionaires with a high profile in this economy. I confess to using it, using it too much really because of the time wasted with it. One of its features remembers what the user posts on its site, and then several years later reminds you with the option of sharing it again if you choose.

A four-year old memory for us recently showed up and my wife re-posted it. It had to do with the time we drove to the Nome schoolhouse for an event they called "Makers Mart." I wrote a brief narrative about our visit and placed it with some pictures on Facebook. The significance of the matter today has to do family history. It is best explained by printing it here.

"We made our first visit Saturday to the Nome Schoolhouse to check out their Makers Mart featuring vendors of handmade items. I've been wanting to enter and see the school where my dad and many of his siblings attended for a few years. Upon entering I made the wooden stairs squeak and groan like any of the buildings of this type but must say the owners have done a great job in making the over-one hundred year place presentable and usable. One room housed a collection of interesting artifacts. I wanted to verify the age of the building and a couple of men were standing in there. One was looking at an old 1928 Barnes county atlas opened to Raritan Township. He asked my name and said 'Right there is where Buelings used to live on Carl Lindemann's place.' Turned out he knew quite a few stories about my family."

The platte map clearly showed Carl Lindemann's name printed on that map of Raritan Township about a mile north of the village of Nome. I always knew my dad's family lived there, but so many details remained to learn. On that same Facebook post, something Dad had written clarified some of it.

He wrote about his parents. "Charles married Ottillia (Tillie) Menge in 1907, and they started farming in the Alice area. Then they moved one half mile north of Nome where they lived from 1922 to 1927. Charlie had a threshing machine and did lots of work in the Nome area. Later they purchased the John Adams farm near Sheldon."

While this all might seem hohum to many readers, I think it illustrates a point of living in a rural area. We are products of a variety of connections. So far, this article mentions Nome, Sheldon, Alice, Raritan Township, Menge, Lindemann, and Bueling. In this household my wife and I are both addicted to family history, and this little story is a small part of what makes me who I am. Who was it that pointed to the farmstead in Raritan Townshop? I believe it was Gary Lindemann.

This article is my last one in 2025. I struggle with the fact of advancing age, soon to be 84, and debate whether or not to continue writing into 2026. The article above illustrates a glaring hole of knowledge about my family history that makes me think I should devote more time to it. My stories have always been accepted by the editors and the publisher for which I am grateful. It would be refreshing to see others pick up their pen and write. Surely there are many out there that can. In closing I wish everybody a Merry Christmas and Happy New Year.

application form will be available at the city offices. In reference to the Aaron Stenson property on 1st Avenue, Mr. Stenson's son was served with the legal notice by the city. Some vehicles were moved and cleaned up. The city will move vehicles by December 8th, if not moved out by the owner and the owner will be responsible for any costs incurred. The property owned by Darrell Nellermoe was addressed as having numerous abandoned vehicles. The council directed Mr. Kelly to issue legal directive to Mr. Nellermoe to clean up the property. In other business, the council committed to supporting the SunFest Rodeo.

In other business, Lions Mike Martin and Karl Stordalen presented concerns to the city advocate to plant trees lost during tornado. They asked if sales tax revenue can be used for that. The council directed Mr. Kelly to explore the legality of using sales tax funds for use outside of the city limits. In closing, the city is looking at increasing online storage for cameras through MLGC from 14 days to 30 days.
