ENDERLIN LIONS

At 6 p.m. sharp Tuesday, December 23 Enderlin Lion President Karlton Stordalen called a Lions membership meeting to order at the Traxside Café. 18 Lions and 2 guests were welcomed and the guests were introduced as Tyler Pfaff and Taylor Prante. President Stordalen also announced we would be having a program later tonight despite the written agenda saying we wouldn't. All stood for the Pledge of Allegiance, the group focusing on an American flag retrieved by Lion Jim Ekeren. Lion Grant Patterson was called on to do a meal prayer. The Traxside staff consisting of Lion Deb Claus, Trax owner and head cook, Lion Jasmin Kasin and Trax server Tessa Baumler brought supper to the tables. Bar-b-Que pork, mashed potatoes, macaroni salad and garlic bread were followed by trays of Christmas cookies. It was a meal in tune with the holiday season.

The substitute program was Lion Andrew Peterson, also a professional Doctor of Veterinary Medicine, and he shared his knowledge and concerns regarding avian bird flu. Conventional wisdom says it is a looming threat and has the potential for the virus to mutate and crossover to people. There have already been local poultry flocks impacted by this quick killer and Lion Peterson has experience, as directed by the State Animal House office, in monitoring the flock clean-up after their decimation. Part of the process in limiting the spread of the disease is to pile the dead birds and compost for several days with the heat produced killing the virus. Lion Peterson said the virus has crossed over the dairy cattle and there is one known human fatality in our country. He is pessimistic, however, and said it is only a matter of time before the virus evolves into a more compatible adaptation for a human host. "It's coming to people," he said. "Is it something to worry about? No, it isn't." Questions and answers followed and everyone in the room was a veteran of the 2020-2022 COVID 19 pandemic and could remember what a life altering experience those several years were. Besides losing friends and relatives to a killer, the many month lock downs totally changed expectations and the way we do business. Lion Peterson gave a very timely, and sobering, update on a health topic we will be hearing about more and more in the years to

Treasurer Tom Farnham followed with a written treasurer's report. Financial activity for all of the Club's accounts were itemized in written format and Treasurer Farnham answered questions and went over highlights. Lion Gary Daub moved for approval, Lion Bob Gruman seconded and the treasurer's report was approved by voice vote. There had been no November membership meeting (no minutes) and the December board meeting minutes were completed after the meeting notices went out. Consequently, there was no secretary's report.

For old business, Lion Dean Torbenson was happy to announce he has received 33 sold calendar lottery books and the Club is well into the profit zone. Lion Torbenson is comfortable the 500 tickets will be sold out and the drawing will start about the promised January 1. Another follow-up was Lion Roxy Johnson telling our involvement with the December 17 Holiday Train was a success. The Lions served 8 gallons of chili, decorated and served hundreds of Christmas cookies and an estimated 100 people enjoyed our two sponsored performances. "Living Water Dance Theatre," shepherded by Lion Elise Trangsrud and Kendra Bartholomay's piano disciples were the talent pre-arranged by Lion Johnson. Thank you notes to these talents were passed around to be signed by Club members. A following old business item was Lion Torbenson announcing the 2025 Community Christmas Lighting displays were looked over by Lion Torbenson and wife Dawn. Their selected winners were Scott and Patty Miller and Bonnie Loomer. Lion Torbenson thought there were more displays this year. A \$100 donation in the winners' names will be made to the HEART program during Giving Hearts day.

For new business, the Club will be paying for and delivering around 20 meals to Enderlin residents. Lion and head cook Deb Claus will do the preparation and the following Lions volunteered to provide vehicles and deliver them Christmas morning: Lions Susan Dopp, Andrew Peterson, Jasmin Kasin, Mike Martin and Owen Trangsrud. "A tradition of many years, the Lake Region Extension Roundup provides area farmers and ranchers with the most upto-date information to prepare for the upcoming season," says Lindsay Overmyer, NDSU Extension agent in Ramsey County.
