informed and validated. "It's one thing to be told—it's another to be able to make choices. People who have doctor for years say it's different here."

While Connect Medical Clinic is still often viewed as a crisis pregnancy center, both Zettel and Arnold emphasize its broader mission. Arnold now treats patients with infertility concerns, among others. "We still meet crisis needs, but we also want to support people's broader needs and be available in non-crisis moments, so they come to us when they need help," Arnold said. "Whatever people think we are, we'd love to connect with them and serve however we can," Zettel added.

Donors can choose to sponsor exam or consultation rooms, with their name—or their business's—displayed on the room's signage. Zettel says these contributions send powerful messages of community support. "We treat people with dignity, and that has a ripple effect beyond the exam room," she said. "Donations signal 'I believe in you' to our patients. These gifts express love and support for every member of the community."

The clinic accepts both self-pay and insurance and offers services including sports physicals, wellness exams, and evaluations for early pregnancy, infertility, post-abortion care, miscarriage recovery, pre-conception planning and gynecological concerns. Its birth control education emphasizes cycle

charting and values-based discussions around contraception. Staff members regularly visit schools and attend public health events such as the Women's Expo to engage with youth and community members.

A recent addition to their services includes a colposcopy machine, which Arnold says is a key asset.

"Now we no longer have to refer patients with abnormal Pap smears to other clinics," he said. "This way, we're staying connected with people."
