CITY OF ROLETTE **ORDINANCE NO. 2023-1** AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHAPTER TWELVE OF THE ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF ROLETTE, NORTH DAKOTA

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROLETTE, NORTH DAKOTA: AMENDMENT

Chapter Twelve, Public Nuisance is hereby ended to add Section 12.0604 of Article 6 as follows: Article 6 - Chronic Nuisance 12.0604 Penalties

1. In addition to the charges authorized and described above, the following penalties, may be sought by the City, and may be ordered and/or imposed, as applicable, by the Courts:

a. First offense. Any person who shall violate any ion of this hereunder shall be issued a warning by the City.

b. Subsequent offenses. Any person who shall violate any provision of this division or any regulation, rule, or order made hereunder within 24 months after com-mitting a previous violation:

· For a second offense a fine of \$250.00

For a third offense a fine of \$500.00
For a fourth offense a fine of \$500.00

c. Each and every day that a violation occurs, connues and/or remains present constitutes a separate offense

d. The City, in addition to the above monetary penalty and special charges may from time to time seek and obtain, and the court may order,

temporary and/or permanent injunctive relief, abatement, and such other legal and/or equitable relief, remedies, judgments, and/or orders of the court against any person and/or property as the court may, from time to time, deem necessary, appropriate and/or desirable to effectuate the intent of this division and the public good, peace, order, welfare, and/or safety.

e. It shall be the responsibility of the person to immediately abate each and every violation upon the premises property as expeditiously as possible, unless otherwise directed by the City or the court.

Organic Chemical Contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products o industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban stormwater runoff, and septic systems

Radioactive Contaminants, which can be naturally occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations which limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) regulations establist limits for contaminants in bottled water which must provide the same protection for public health.

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk firm infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers EPA/Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of in fection by Cryptosperidium and other microbial contaminants are available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).

### Lead Statement

There is no safe level of lead in drinking water. Exposure to lead in drinking water can cause serious health ef ects in all age groups, especially pregnant people, infants (both formula-fed and breast-fed), and young children Some of the health effects to infants and children include decreases in IQ and attention span. Lead exposure car also result in new or worsened learning and behavior problems. The children of persons who are exposed to lear before or during pregnancy may be at increased risk of these harmful health effects. Adults have increased risks o heart disease, high blood pressure, kidneys, or nervous system problems. Contact your health care provider for mere nformation about your risks.

Lead can cause serious health effects in people of all ages, especially pregnant people, infants (both formula fed and breastfed), and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and parts used in service lines and in home plumbing. The city of Dunseith is responsible for providing high quality drinking water and remov Ing lead pipes but cannot control the variety of materials used in the plumbing in your home. Because lead levels may vary over time, lead exposure is possible even when your tap sampling results do no

detect lead at one point in time. You can help protect yourself and your family by identifying and removing lead materials within your home plumbing and taking steps to reduce your family's risk. Using a filter, certified by an Ameri can National Standards Institute accredited certifier to reduce lead, is effective in reducing lead exposures.

Follow the instructions provided with the filter to ensure the filter is used properly. Use only cold water for drinking, cooking, and making baby formula. Boiling water does not remove lead from water. Before using tap water for drinking, cooking, or making baby formula, flush your pipes for several minutes. You can do this by running your tap, taking a shower, doing laundry or a load of dishes. If you have a lead, service line or galvanized requiring replacement service line, you may need to. flush your pipes for a longer period. ### Lead Service Line Inventory Information

US EPA has recently published the Lead and Copper Rule Revision. The purpose of this revision is to strengther public health protections by removing lead service lines within public water systems. One requirement of this rule revision was to inventory all drinking water service lines within our public water system and notify consumers which type of line serves each property. You may have recently received a letter from our system with tRE: TMS 1his informa-

The inventory is a listing of all service lines and the material composition of each line. The types of lines being documented are Lead lines, Galvanizied Requiring Replacement (GRR) and lines made of Unknown Material. Classification of a service line as being comprised of Unknown Service Line material indicates that our system

cannot currently confirm the material of both the public and private portions of the line with written records. Nonlead lines were also documented; however, we were not required to notify consumers with documented nonlear lines. The classification of the type of service line serving a residence was based on historical data regarding the prop erty and in some cases verification of the type of material on the privately owned side of the line by visual inspection or replacement records of the owner.

The current Service Line Inventory for our system has been completed and is available for viewing at our office Please contact the city of Dunseith at 701-241-5596 should you have any questions. Additional work to update the service line inventory, including inspe!tion of the line, may need to be performed to further document and confirm the type of material making up both the public and private portions of the line serving your home or business. We will need the help of home/building owners in order to access the service line on the private side of the service line to positively identify the material of the line that carries water within your home/building. Our system may perform this work with our own system employees, or we may contract with engineering firms or third-party contractors to complete this work to improve our service line inventory.
