Bottineau man arrested for alleged sexual contact with 16-year-old in Rolette County

A 53-year-old Bottineau man has been charged with corruption of a minor following an investigation into alleged sexual contact with a 16year-old boy in a casino parking lot last month.

Todd Lane Hunskor was arrested on November 17 and charged with corruption of a minor involving a victim over 15 years old, according to court documents filed in Rolette County District Court.

The investigation began on October 14 when Sky Dancer Casino security observed suspicious activity in their employee parking lot. Security staff watched as Hunskor waited in his pickup and appeared to use his cell phone before moving to the back

A short time later, another pickup arrived, being driven by a minor male. The teen got out and entered the back seat of Hunskor's vehicle, where both remained for about 13 minutes. Casino surveillance showed the pickup moving repeatedly during this time, and at least one person appeared to remove clothing.

The 16-year-old victim was forensically interviewed on October 23 and told investigators he and Hunskor initially made contact through X, formerly known as Twitter, and a related application. The conversation between the two was sexual in nature, and images were exchanged, according to the affidavit.

The victim said Hunskor asked if he was free that night and arranged to meet at the casino parking lot. When the teenager arrived, he found Hunskor in the back seat area of the truck with the seats lifted up and a blanket and pillow on the floor.

During the encounter, Hunskor reportedly told the victim he "likes young boys, but waits for them to turn 18," according to court documents. The victim reported feeling "disgusting" after the incident and said he was blocking out what hap-

Federal agents obtained a search warrant for Hunskor's residence at 216 Sunset Bay Road in Bottineau and his vehicle Nov. 5. When law enforcement attempted to serve the warrant on November 7, they learned Hunskor was traveling in Georgia. The warrant was executed on November 17 when Hunskor returned to

North Dakota.


During the search, agents interviewed Hunskor's wife. She told inshe discovered vestigators approximately five years ago that her husband was using Grindr, a dating application for gay men. She said she confronted him about the app use and thought he had "gotten over" those

His wife also told agents she discovered her husband had a "burner phone" when they lived in Minot, which she suspected he used to communicate with men.

Law enforcement found multiple condoms, personal lubricant, adult novelty items, and a feminine hygiene product in Hunskor's pickup during their search.

When agents attempted to interview Hunskor, he requested an attorney, and the interview was concluded. He was arrested and transported to the Bottineau County jail to await transfer to Rolette County authorities.

Hunskor was scheduled for an initial court appearance Monday, November 24, but he reportedly took his own life on November 20, 2025.
