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Grace Lutheran, Driscoll, is closing

The last active church in Driscoll will be having a Holy Closing ceremony on Sunday November 2nd, 2025.

Grace Lutheran Church was organized in July of 1905. The congregation back in those days met in several different locations, other churches and unused schoolhouses at first, until they decided to build a church. In 1926, plans were made to build their own church. The basement was started but these plans had to be abandoned when the great depression hit. Once again, they relied on the use of the Methodist Church to hold their services. In 1938, work resumed on the basement. July 9th of 1939, the first service was held in the basement. Lack of funding caused further delay and the building of the rest of the Church took until the end of 1953 with the first service being held

on Christmas Day 1953. In 1966, the membership at the church was 225 members. It was then the church started a permanent plaque for past and current ministers.

Driscoll was also once home to St. Paul's another Lutheran Church, a Methodist Church and a Catholic Church. There was also a church north of Driscoll, Zion Lutheran, that closed in 1969. All of the Zion members were transferred to Grace Lutheran Church in Driscoll.

While it gained membership when the north church closed, as the town of Driscoll's' population decreased, so did the membership. The Congregation dwindled and no longer has the funds to continue. Now the only Church left in Driscoll will no longer be holding weekly services. They will, however, not be entirely closed. Weddings, funerals and other services will continue.



Final budgets for 2026 highlight Commissioners October meeting

The Kidder County Commissioners met on Friday for one last review, and final revisions, of the 2026 budget at the Kidder County Courthouse. The review took place during a special one-hour meeting at 9 a.m.

Before approving the budget for 2026 in the afternoon session, the Commissioners made adjustments to the Weed Control section of the budget to address areas of need in that area.

County roads became the next topic of discussion, beginning

with the 30-minute Public Comment period at the beginning of the regularly scheduled 10 a.m. meeting. The issue of the lone public commentor was the upkeep of some county roads when "softball-sized" rocks were pulled up during blading, leaving small

divots in the roads that make traversing them difficult.

While the overall state of the roads has been well-received by the general public, these issues remain a concern of the commissioners, who pledged to address it.

"The problem is these sized rocks keep working their way up to the surface," Chairman Darrell

Guthmiller remarked.

The road crews currently work 10 hours a day, four days a week, to maintain the roads, but their hours will be cut back to eight a day, five days a week, next month as the winter weather, and snow and ice, move in.
