WHY DON'T CARDINALS GO SOUTH IN WINTER?

We were curious about this so we asked Grok. Here's what that new-fangled and sometimes notorious digital information digester and spitter-outer told us:

Diet flexibility — Cardinals eat seeds, berries, fruits, and insects. In winter, they switch heavily to seeds and berries (including from shrubs like dogwood, sumac, or backyard feeders), which are available even in cold climates without needing to travel south.

Adaptations for cold — They fluff feathers for insulation, shiver to generate heat, can lower body temperature slightly to conserve energy, tuck bills under wings, and roost in dense cover. They also form loose winter flocks (with other species like juncos or sparrows) for better foraging and safety, reducing territorial aggression.

No need to leave — Unlike true migrants (e.g., warblers or many thrushes), they don't face severe food shortages that force relocation.

Now, for all you (capital C) Cardinals who went to Arizona or Florida or some such warm place for the winter, what's your excuse? :)
