want the legislature to fund this not just by one or two polls, but by multiple polls (82% of North Dakotans polled support it).

What is interesting about the makeup of the polls is that it shows that the issue is not a Democratic or Republican issue. It is quite nonpartisan, and I've found that to be true in my conversations with constituents.

I do want to clarify a few points, though. In 2023, we passed a law, so no students are denied meals, and the meals provided are the same for all students, despite the ability to pay. The drawback here that people don't talk about is that many schools experience budget shortfalls because people don't pay their delinquent lunch accounts.

Last year, Mandan had approximately \$400,000 owed from people not paying for their children's lunches and it ended up being absorbed through the district and paid for by local property taxes.

I'd also like to point out the difference between a ballot measure and a bill the legislature passes are that a ballot measure

goes into our constitution, which means the legislature cannot change it. So, if we experience tough financial times, we must always pay for the school lunches and may have to make difficult funding choices.

In the end, I voted in favor of paying for universal meals for our students. The issue was less about my own personal convictions and more about what the people of North Dakota have shown they want as well as I would like the legislature to have some flexibility in the future for funding it.

But as you likely know, the bill failed in the Senate. The public will probably have the opportunity to weigh in this fall during the general election.

Thank you all for allowing me to serve you in the legislature. It's such an honor to represent District 33.

- HCR 3038 was a congratulatory message on the YMCA 175th anniversary
- SB 2403 created an emergency loan fund for medical facilities in financial trouble
- SB 2404 created a loan fund for the IT department and the PSC during a litigation process.

All of the above bills passed both chambers.

Two bills that failed by small margins were HB 1624, requiring all students to qualify for free breakfast and free lunch, and HB 1627, which moved the qualifications for free student lunch from the current 225% of the Federal Poverty level (we just recently increased this substantially during the regular 2025 legislative session), up to 300% of the Federal Poverty Level for qualification. Under current law, a family of four with annual approximate income below \$72,000 already quali-

fies for free meals.

I voted against both lunch bills, HB 1624 and HB 1627. I strongly oppose a pending petition for a constitutional measure to provide free lunch. I encourage and am willing to have a civil conversation with any individual or group willing to do so.

I invite you to do a deep dive, study all the consequences, before signing such a petition. Our constitution is too precious and sacred to clutter with these types of measures. At present, no child goes hungry in North Dakota under provisions made by the 2023 Legislative Session.
