ABBREVIATED NOTICE OF INTENT TO REVISE ADMINISTRATIVE RULES RELATING TO MODIFIED PUBLIC SCHOOL CALENDAR

TAKE NOTICE that the North Dakota Department of Public Instruction (NDDPI) will hold a public hearing to address proposed changes of N.D. Admin. Code 67-15, Modified Public School Calendar; at 9:30 AM on Thursday, June 4, 2026, in the Peace Garden Room at the State Capitol, 600 E. Boulevard Ave., Bismarck, ND 58505.

The purpose of the proposed changes is to amend 67-15-02, Reconfiguration of Instructional Days, to rename the chapter "Four-Day School Week" and to update the criteria for which a school district can be approved to operate under a four-day school week. The proposed rules are not expected to have an impact on the regulated community in excess of \$50,000.

The proposed rules may be reviewed at the NDDPI Office of School Approval and Opportunity, ND State Capitol, 600 E. Boulevard Avenue, Bismarck, ND 58505-0440. dealt with health issues but has since reopened and rebranded the restaurant.

Owing to his trucking business downsizing, Dahl said he had a little more time on his hands, which is why he thought about running for a seat on the county commission. With big industry companies such as data centers, wind farms and cryptocurrency mining interested in developing within Oliver County, Dahl knows the importance of the commission to stay on track with creating ordinances and policies that can both guide and protect the county and its residents as big industry developments approach the county. He also knows how emotionally charged residents have been about the issue.

"Right now, the county is tearing itself apart," Dahl said. "I hope to bring new and open-mind perspective to the board."

Husfloen, who initially suggested to appoint Dahl, said Dahl is a good fit for the commission as he has shown he cares for the community and the county, as a whole. One characteristic Husfloen likes in Dahl is that he isn't afraid to speak up but also is a good listener, as well.

"Brad has really been a backer of the community," Husfloen said. "He's a businessman here in town, he speaks out, and he speaks in a tone that everyone will listen to. He promotes Center like nobody else. He's also a good promoter of the county, being active and has done his work to try and bring in new industry."

Even before he petitioned to be a candidate for the county commissioner position, Dahl said he was talking to whomever he could to understand both sides of the data center issue, those who supported

the potential that data centers could bring to help enrich the community, and those who were opposed of allowing more big industry in, fearing it could interrupt the lifestyle and threaten the health and well being of those who have to live near the facilities.

Dahl said no matter what side a person is on when it comes to issues like data center development, he wants to hear their concerns and talk it out with them, which, he said, he has a gift of gab.

"I'm willing to talk to anybody," Dahl said. "I will sit down in an airport and anyone I sit next to I'd have a conversation with them all day. I like meeting people, I enjoy talking with people."

Dahl is not shy about trying to come up with solutions to problems and finding the answers to what residents are most concerned about.

"I enjoy being a problem solver and thinking outside the box," he said. "I'd much rather you come to me with a problem and discuss the solution. If I don't know the problem, then I can't fix it. But every problem has a solution, and if we all put our heads together, work together, we can find those solutions together."

Husfloen was disappointed to see Berger step down, knowing he worked hard and took on many things while he was a commissioner. Though he knows Dahl will have to catch up with all that the county commission has going on, Husfloen said he knows Dahl is up to the task.

"He's all around really good for the community," Husfloen said. "He will do an excellent job as a commissioner. We're fortunate he accepted the job. He'll serve the county well."

Consumers who willfully make false statements in order to obtain the benefit can be punished by fine or imprisonment, or may be barred from the program.

To apply for Lifeline service, you must use the National Verifier. To see if you qualify, go to: lifelinesupport.org. You can also print and mail a copy of the application. Once you have applied and been approved, call us at 800-417-3849. Lifeline is only available in limited areas in Iowa, New York, North Dakota and Wisconsin where Verizon Wireless has been designated to offer these programs.
