Stanley Ambulance Annual Report- Stanley Ambulance service has been in existence since Oct. 24, 1971. It is a non-profit 24-hour service and is licensed by the State Health Department. Stanley Ambulance responded to 314 calls in 2010. Up from 300 calls in 2009.
