of the longest-living birds in the world, Forsburg said. Studies done in the 1970s and 1980s found some whooping cranes live into their 40s. "It's pretty remarkable when you think of a 45-year-old bird that's traveled 2,500 miles twice per year for that many years," Forsburg said. Caven said the wildlife refuge system stretching across central North Dakota is extremely important for the birds. While it's hard to see them, the birds do spend a few weeks in the state in the autumn, though the best time to see them may be in April, he said. Barry Hartup, a veterinarian who worked as director of conservation medicine at the International Crane Foundation until retiring in 2023, may join the bikers on part of their journey through North Dakota. "I think this (journey) provides them a really neat perspective in what they're trying to communicate, sort of witnessing what the birds see," Hartup, who has been involved in tracking whooping cranes for nearly three decades. "It's a pretty unique way to say what's going on on the ground,

what's the landscape like, what are the stresses on the system, what can we plan for the future, and what was it we really didn't know about," Hartup said. Caven and Forsburg said they've had several others join in parts of the pedal between Texas and Nebraska, where they were reached by phone for this interview. They welcome others to learn more about the birds and their habitat along the way.

The North Dakota Natural Resources Trust, Meadowlark Initiative and Audubon Society plan to host an event in Bismarck on or around June 16 so they can share the story of their journey.

NNA Welcomes House Government Operations Subcommittee Hearing Featuring The PRC

On Thursday, June 4, 2026, the House Government Operations Subcommittee held a hearing featuring all of the members of the Postal Regulatory Commission (PRC). NNA commends Chairman Pete Sessions (R-TX) and Ranking Member Kweisi Mfume (D-MD) for holding this important hearing focusing on the oversight of the USPS. This examination is critical given the failing state of USPS finances that Postmaster General David Steiner has claimed could lead to operational insolvency as soon as October of this year and the essential role of the Commission in protecting the interests of the public, particularly in the rural communities our members serve.

NNA has submitted a statement urging the subcommittee to resolve two conflicting realities: the PRC is an essential safeguard for the interests of the public and mailers who depend on the USPS that are subject to its monopoly. Throughout the period of the Delivering for America plan, the PRC has utterly failed to fulfill that responsibility.

As it contemplates USPS requests for more financial assistance, Congress must ensure that any new investments are protected by clarifying the mandate and power of the Commission to fulfill the role it was created for," NNA Chair Martha Diaz Aszkazny, publisher of the San Fernando (California) Valley Sun and El Sol, said. "The failures of the Delivering for America plan were evident from the start and mechanisms must be provided to hold the USPS accountable for quality service, real measurement of cost and service performance and improved efficiency to keep periodical postage affordable and to prevent anything like it from every happening again."

In its statement, NNA urges that any relief legislation include reforms to address three critical areas:

- Accessibility: Preserve the Universal Service Obligation requiring six-day mail and package delivery to every address.
- Affordability: Limit rate hikes to once per year and keep them af-

fordable for small businesses and consumers. A CPI-based price cap for Market Dominant products would require USPS to improve efficiency and live within its means. Any service reductions must be required to provide guaranteed savings.

Accountability: Strengthen the PRC's oversight with binding authority over service changes and a dedicated customer advocate to ensure USPS improves efficiency and cost discipline to live within its means. NNA will continue to advocate for legislative reforms that advance these principles and will advise the membership of any opportunities to engage with their Members of Congress to support them that result from the hearing.

New Research Shows 2025 Tourism Dip

North Dakota's latest Tourism economic impact report, prepared by Tourism Economics, shows the state's visitor economy dipped in 2025 amid a significant decline in Canadian travel. While overall visitation and spending saw decreases compared with 2024, the findings highlight the continued strength of the domestic travel market, and independent data points to early signs of momentum heading into 2026.

According to the research, North Dakota welcomed 25.6 million visitors in 2025, a 2.6 percent decrease from the previous year. Domestic travelers continued to make up most of the market, accounting for 88.4 percent of total visitation. International volumes declined sharply, driven largely by reduced Canadian travel following a 23.9 percent drop in border crossings reported in the state's annual travel update.

Visitor spending reached \$3.4 billion in 2025, down 1.2 percent from 2024. On average, visitors spent \$9.2 million per day in the state, with per-visitor spending averaging \$132.

Tourism generated \$5.6 billion in total economic impact and produced \$304.4 million in state and local taxes. Without those visitor-generated

revenues, each North Dakota household would need to pay an additional \$919 in taxes annually. Tourism also sustained 6.5 percent of all jobs statewide, representing one in every fifteen jobs.

"Destinations with significant international exposure, especially to Canada, welcomed fewer international visitors during increased trade tensions between the countries," said Tourism Economics Economist Christian Fonseca. "However, demand for domestic leisure travel supported growth in total U.S. visitation."

State tourism leaders say the findings highlight opportunities to elevate North Dakota's visibility and capture additional market share.

"While last year's declines were expected partially due to reduced Canadian travel and lower park visitation, the data also reinforce the strong return on investment that tourism provides," said North Dakota Department of Commerce Tourism and Marketing Director Sara Otte Coleman. "Tourism Economics continues to show a clear link between marketing investment and higher visitor spending. With sustained, strategic investment, North Dakota can continue to grow market share and strengthen long-term eco-

omic impact."

Several positive indicators are already emerging for 2026, including:

- Canadian border entries increased in April for the first time in fifteen months.
- Visitation to Theodore Roosevelt National Park is up 27.3 percent year to date through April.
- Short-term rental bookings in North Dakota are 18.9 percent higher than a year ago according to AirDNA.

First-quarter taxable sales and purchases show growth in key tourism-related sectors, including a 1.4 percent increase in accommodation and food services and a 13.4 percent increase in arts, entertainment and recreation compared with the first quarter of 2025.

Lane Closure Required For Repairs At U.S. 83 Culvert Replacement Project In Minot

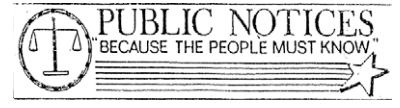
