

Michael and Ellen (Herda) Connor

Interview: September 21, 2016 County: Ramsey City: Devils Lake

Brilliant at Math with Fifth-Grade Education

Michael states, "Dad was probably the most brilliant mathematician I ever met. He could do sums in his head and division, and he always had little quirks of how you rounded things off and multiply and subtract. He helped me with algebra and geometry. Fifth-grade education, but very astute, well-liked. He was still farming when he passed away at 85." Michael was born in 1943 and resides on the same farm where he grew up.



"I always thought I was gonna farm. Then I started thinking about being a [vo-ag] teacher." In 1961, Michael was elected president of the North Dakota FFA organization in his senior year and, in 1963, received the prestigious American Farmer Degree at the national level. After a couple of quarters of college, Michael found himself back on the farm and working at the local J.C. Penney. He then accepted a managerial position for the company in Minnesota. "When I left North Dakota with Penneys I thought, 'So long, been good to know ya. I'll come back to visit, but I'm gone.' About 10 years later, I started thinking, 'You know, things aren't that bad in North Dakota.'"

He moved home to work with the Devils Lake Chamber of Commerce. His career grew and changed—city commissioner, city administrator, and banking. He also managed the Devils Lake Basin Joint Water Resource Board and retired from there in 2008. Michael took a lesson away from that job: "When it comes to water there's always somebody downhill being affected. When you do a coulee clean out, you don't start at the top, you start at the bottom and work your way up—a classic example of having to work together."

Michael married Ellen Herda in 1978. She grew up in Crary, North Dakota, but moved to Devils Lake when she was in the fourth grade. "Ellen and I," Michael says, "grew up a couple houses apart, traded comic books when we were little."

What is Michael's approach to successfully working with people? "Just keep it simple. Work together." Michael adds, "I'm rich in friends. Friends and family. That matters."

Game and Fish Offers Wildlife Food Plot Seed

The North Dakota Game and Fish Department is once again offering free seed for the 2026 growing season to landowners interested in planting wildlife food plots for pheasants and other wildlife species.

Rather than a traditional corn or sunflower food plot, Game and Fish is offering a seed mix that provides increased plant diversity, including flowering plants from spring through fall, which will attract insects, the major diet component of pheasant chicks. Additionally, the mix will provide needed cover during spring and summer, as well as a winter food source.


This food plot campaign does not require a department Private Land Open To Sportsmen contract, however, participating landowners are encouraged to allow reasonable public access. This could mean simply providing permission to hunters from time to time, utilizing custom dates in electronic posting, putting up "Ask Before You Enter" signs around the area, or not posting the surrounding land. Additionally, participating landowners cannot charge a fee for hunting.

The department will provide enough seed to cover up to a maximum 5-acre planting at no cost to the landowner.

Landowners interested in receiving the seed must sign up online by April 3. Seed will be available in May at Game and Fish offices in Bismarck, Jamestown, Devils Lake, Harvey, Dickinson, Williston and Riverdale.

Game and Fish private land biologists can provide technical assistance on food plot location and site preparation.

Landowners interested in additional financial incentives may be considered for the PLOTS program. More information is available by contacting a private land biologist at any Game and Fish office, or email privatelands@nd.gov.



Building Your Life on a Solid Foundation.

Isaiah 28:16 Luke 6:47-49

Why would someone build a house without a foundation?

Some attempt to build without a foundation to save time and avoid the demanding work of preparing the base.

Every building has a firm foundation. Without it, the building would fall.

Similarly, our faith must have a firm foundation. That foundation is Jesus. Everything else will ultimately fail—even the church—when Christ is no longer the foundation.

The first reason that churches fail is because they violate their commitment to Jesus Christ as their foundation. This message is a call to build our lives on eternal and spiritual values. A solid foundation leads to transformation, purpose, and fulfillment, reminding us that our lives are not pointless.

A life grounded in Christ is never lived in vain. When life becomes difficult—and it will—we do not retreat. We must persevere with faith and resolve. The longer we push the limits, the stronger our faith becomes. We are ready for greater service and expanded ministry. We become strong, unshakable, and steadfast.

The Importance of a Strong Foundation: When working on construction projects at the sugar factory in Sidney, I learned firsthand the importance of a properly built foundation. Our task was to prepare footings capable of supporting large storage tanks. This required precise measurements, reinforced materials, and properly mixed concrete. We would build a structure out of plywood and run rebar through it. We would secure the rebar through the wood to keep our concrete intact like a mold, which would be poured into its formation.

The project manager repeatedly emphasized that no structure could endure without a solid foundation.

It must be strong enough to bear weight, withstand environmental stress, and maintain long-term stability. He believed in taking every necessary step to ensure that the foundation was safe and secure.

The foundation provides stability and support for the entire structure; without it, the foundation would collapse.

In the same way, our spiritual lives require a firm foundation. Just as reinforced concrete supports a heavy structure, a life grounded in Christ provides stability, resilience, and endurance through life's challenges.

A Spiritual Parallel: Jesus taught that a house built on solid rock withstands storms, while one built on sand collapses. Likewise, those who establish their lives on a strong spiritual foundation are better equipped to endure hardships, disappointments and uncertainty.

Building our lives on a solid spiritual foundation can be compared to a solid anchor, providing steadfast support during life's inevitable trials and tribulations.

A life founded on a secure and unyielding foundation gives us inner peace and moral clarity.

It enables us to navigate life's challenges with resilience and strength and to confront and overcome the many heartbreaks and disappointments that may come our way.

"STEPS NEEDED FOR BUILDING ON A STRONG SPIRITUAL FOUNDATION:"

1. FAITH: Faith is the cornerstone of spiritual life. Faith is the confidence that God will do what He has promised. Faith is always tested for at least three reasons: Prove the fact that our faith is real: To help our faith grow. And to bring glory to the Lord.

Trusting God for guidance beyond human understanding provides strength, hope, and endurance in difficult seasons.

This trust provides comfort and strength during challenging moments, encouraging strength and inspiring hopefulness for what lies ahead.

Oswald Chambers said, "Faith never knows where is being led, but it loves and knows the one Who is leading."

To apply our faith is to live as if God will keep His promises.

2. PRAYER & MEDITATION: Prayer is something we learn to do. We are not born knowing how to pray. Like the disciples, we must learn how to pray.

One of the earliest—and often

most challenging—lessons in prayer is learning to pray in alignment with God's will.

As we learn to pray, we will learn to discern His answers. It may be yes, no, wait, or "My grace is sufficient." We must be consistent in our prayer life.

Consistent prayer and reflection on Scripture deepen our connection with God. These practices bring clarity, peace, and spiritual renewal amid life's uncertainties.

Whether it's through reciting scriptural prayers or simply reflecting on your beliefs, these activities can help you find comfort and strength in your spiritual journey.

3. SEEK FOR SPIRITUAL GUIDANCE: Spiritual guidance is a confidential, relational process—often with a mentor, guide, or through inner practice. It is designed to help individuals recognize, interpret, and deepen their connection with the Lord, and gain wisdom, for daily life.

You are able to focus on spiritual discernment. Seeking counsel from spiritually mature individuals fosters growth, accountability, and wisdom as we establish and strengthen our faith. You are able to develop a solid foundation for your faith and spiritual development. The Holy Spirit will guide you through the maze of life.

He can guide you if you have a knowledge of God's Word and He will establish in your minds God's will for you.

4. ENGAGE IN AND SUPPORT CHURCH ACTIVITIES: Participating in church life builds community, encouragement, and shared accountability.

Fellowship strengthens faith through mutual support and service. Fellowship offers encouragement. Fellowship and service strengthen faith through accountability, encouragement, and shared purpose.

Hebrews 10:24-25 "And let us consider how we may spur on another on toward love and good deeds, not giving up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing, but encouraging one another—and all the more as you see the Day approaching." You never know who you will encourage just by coming to church.

5. EMBRACE CHALLENGES AS GROWTH OPPORTUNITIES:

Life's trials can become opportunities for personal and spiritual growth.

When approached with faith, challenges develop perseverance, character and maturity.

Embracing these challenges nurtures our ability to adapt, develop new skills, and deepen our understanding of ourselves and the world.

Through these experiences, we genuinely evolve and progress on our spiritual journey.

6. PRACTICE MORAL PRINCIPLES: Living by ethical and biblical principles guides decision-making and behavior, enabling believers to live with integrity and purpose.

Living by moral principles in the Bible centers on loving God and others, practicing integrity, and walking in the Spirit.

By observing these ethical principles, people, especially Christians, can make wise choices in various situations, ultimately contributing to a more just and just society.

Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewal of your mind, that by testing you may discern what is the will of God, what is good and acceptable and perfect.

"WHAT FOUNDATION ARE YOU BUILDING ON?"

What is built on a solid foundation which Christ, will endure and be rewarded.

Jesus Christ is the only foundation that withstands time, failure, and uncertainty. So, let us continue to build on the foundation Jesus laid and trust that, by faith, we trust Him to supply all we need according to His riches in Christ Jesus.

Is your life built on the flimsy base of your own success or dreams? Or is it set on a firm foundation? Building on a solid spiritual foundation is a lifelong commitment.

Through faith, prayer, obedience, community, and perseverance, we can live resilient lives that honor God and serve others. When everything else fails, Christ remains the foundation that endures. Building our lives on Christ produces a firm foundation that enables us to support others and brings glory to God.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the Morton County Board of Commissioners, Morton County, North Dakota will accept bids until Tuesday March 24th, 2026 at 10:15 A.M. (CT). Bids will be opened and read at that time at the Morton County Shop Building, located at: 2916 37th Street NW, Mandan, ND 58554. Bid results and final disposition will be presented to the County Commission on Tuesday March 24th, 2026 at 5:30pm (CT) in the Commissioners Room located in the basement of the Morton County Courthouse, for the following item.

CONTRACT GRAVEL HAULING FOR COUNTY ROADS
Equipment used must meet the approval of the Road Superintendent. Bids shall be submitted in a sealed envelope to the Morton County Highway Department.

Specifications are available at the office of the Morton County Highway Department, 2916 37th Street NW, Mandan, North Dakota 58554. Phone (701)667-3346.

Bidders are required to submit a copy of a current Contractor's License. Said license to be submitted in an envelope separate from the Bid information. Each successful bidder must submit evidence of general liability insurance coverage prior to award of bid. The mailing address is: Morton County Highway Department, 2916 37th Street NW, Mandan North Dakota 58554.

A Bidder's Bond will not be required of Bidders. Instead the successful Bidder will be required to post a Performance Bond in the amount of \$10,000 immediately after award of the Bid. The purpose of the Bond is to assure that the Bidder will honor their unit price commitment for the specified time period. Should a Bidder default on their Contract, the Morton County Board of Commissioners will retain the amount of Bond as liquidated damages.

Awarded Bids will be considered valid for one year beyond the date of award.

The Board reserves the right to reject any and all bids; to waive technicalities or to accept such as may be determined to be in the best interest of the County.
