

## First Time She Saw Her Husband "I Was Sunk"

Born in 1933, Marlene Himle Heth's true love story began in the Minot bus depot. She was waiting for a bus to Bismarck, where she worked for the telephone company.

"Well, here comes this Marine, all decked out with a C bag over his shoulder. He was heading back to California to ship out for Korea. I thought, 'Oh man, he turns me on,' but it took a while for him to notice me, because he liked to read. He had a book in front of him, and he didn't pay any attention to me. He was at one end of the bus depot waiting room, and I was at the other end. There we sat alone." Finally, LeRoy Heth, noticed her, and they sat together on the bus to Bismarck. "We talked all the way, and he asked me to write him. I was writing to about 18 other guys in the military, because this was the middle of the war. So I wrote to him from then until he came back in July 1953.

"When LeRoy got back, I knew he was coming, but he was about a day late, and I was little bit blue. Somebody knocked on the door, and there stood that Marine. Oh, man. He had the most beautiful blue eyes and nice smile. That was it. He had fell in love with me, I guess, over the letters, and I was sunk when I seen him again.

"He had to go back to California to be mustered out. He came back and gave me a diamond ring. Third time I ever seen him. We got married six months later.

"No," Marlene says, when asked if that wasn't a little fast. "It didn't seem like it at the time, but when I tell somebody [our story], they think, 'That should be in a True Story magazine or something.' You know, when he passed away, he still had a book beside this bedside. Well yah, it wasn't all moonlight and roses, but we never did have a knocked down drag-out fight." Their love story lasted 58 years and produced four children.

# National Agriculture Month

Almost all of us take our food for granted but it comes from hard-working farmers and ranchers throughout the world—not the grocery store!

National Agriculture Month is celebrated in March with National Agriculture Day observed on March 17 each year. This observance was initiated by the Agriculture Council of America in 1973. It is a non-profit organization to raise awareness about the vital role of agriculture in society. Their goal was to educate the public about how food and fiber products were produced, the importance of agriculture, maintaining a strong economy for farmers and promoting awareness of agricultural contributions to our daily life.

The first National Ag Day was celebrated in Washington, DC in 1979. For many years John Deere sponsored Ag Day posters.

The word "agriculture" comes from the Latin word "agri" which means field and the word "cultura" meaning cultivation. An American scientist, Norman Ernest Borlaug, is known as the 'father of agriculture'.

In 1870 half of the population was employed in the ag industry but in 2008 less than 2 percent were employed by the ag sector. In 2019 there were 22.2 million jobs in agriculture and the food business. The nation's feed, fiber and fuel also involves agriculture.

North Dakota leads the nation in producing spring wheat, durum wheat, sunflowers (oil and eating), dry edible beans, pinto beans, rye, oats, canola, flaxseed and honey. We also raise corn, sugarbeets, potatoes, soybeans, barley, winter wheat, pulse crops and numerous specialty crops, such as buckwheat, oats, millet, garbanzo beans, sorghum, mustard and some fruits like grapes, strawberries, raspberries and chokecherries. We also raise various kinds of livestock. Cattle contributes over \$1 billion to our economy. There are also dairy cattle, swine, sheep, horses, bison, farmed elk, goats and turkeys.

We have the only State Mill and Elevator in the nation and it produces Dakota Maid flour.

One bushel of wheat makes about 42 one and a half pound loaves of bread. Durum means hard and it is the hardest of all 6 kinds of wheat. One bushel makes about 210 servings of pasta. A bushel of field corn will make about 3 gallons of ethanol plus feed for livestock. A bushel of canola makes about two quarts of cooking oil. North Dakota potatoes will make 2.8 billion servings of French fries.

Besides March 17 to celebrate all agriculture, there are numerous other days to celebrate different products of agriculture. They include: January 24 is National Peanut Butter Day, February 17 is National Cabbage Day, March 1 is National Pig Day, March 31 is National Tater Day, May 28 is National Hamburger Day, June 11 is National Corn on the Cob Day, June 12 is National Jerky Day, August 3 is National Watermelon Day with August 4 as National Beer Day and October 28 is World Chocolate Day. There are more but these are the most fun ones. Take your pick, have fun and celebrate agriculture!



## Sunday is Palm Sunday.

Palm Sunday marks the triumphant entry of Jesus Christ into Jerusalem, a journey that led to the fulfillment of God's redemptive plan for humanity.

This event was not merely a political display, but a prophetic moment filled with deep spiritual significance.

As Jesus rode into the city on a donkey, He declared His identity as the Messiah and the Prince of Peace.

The people shouted "Hosanna," laying down their garments and palm branches in His path, signifying honor, celebration, and submission.

Yet this same crowd would later turn against Him.

Palm Sunday reminds us not only of celebration but of the indecisiveness of human loyalty and the steadfastness of divine purpose.

This day calls every believer to reflect on the kind of welcome we give Jesus in our hearts.

Do we truly honor Him as Lord and King, or do we only praise Him when it's convenient?

Today, we explore what Palm Sunday teaches us about Christ, His mission, and our response.

We are going to look at some of the events that happened when Christ rode on that donkey to town.

### I. The Respect of the People

Throwing their cloaks on the colt was not meant because it was hot out, it was meant to give Jesus a cushion when he rode on the donkey

His disciples were to be just nice to Him.

When they came near to the city of Jerusalem there was tons of People out there to cheer for Jesus

Keep in mind there was no KNDR to keep you informed. Billboards were not around.

Telephones were not invented. There was no FaceBook to post that Jesus was coming.

No Instagram, TikTok or other social platforms to get the word out, that Jesus was coming.

The only way that they could have known that Jesus was coming was by word of mouth

That is impressive if you had all those people coming without our modern-day advertisement ideas

Then the whole crowd, without the aid of a PA system, starting JOYFULLY praising God

They praised Jesus for the miracles they had seen.

They were singing songs that they all knew (also known as Psalms) Shouting joyfully doing whatever they could to make it known that they were wanting to praise God.

Application

Do we show God that much respect? Think about it.

There was no food after the service.

There was no live entertainment. There was just genuine celebration taking place.

People honestly praising God out of respect for what he has done.

Why don't we give God that much respect.

Don't ever be that person. Don't ever lose the respect for God.

Don't ever turn away from God. Don't ever stop praising God.

The great evangelist, Billy Graham, has been quoted many times as saying that the greatest mission field in our country today is in our local church.

The people are already sitting in our churches.

Now I am not sure whether this statement is true or not, but one thing that I do know is that many people know what to say, How to say it, even how to act in it.

But when the rubber truly meets that road, there is no personal relationship with Jesus Christ.

No salvation- just empty words. We see a perfect example of this in our two passages this morning.

On Sunday Jesus rode into the city with the people shouting praises and praising God for all the wonderful miracles they had seen.

This is Palm Sunday.

The one-week Jesus was he hailed as greatest person ever then just five days later he was crucified.

It is amazing how people can change so quickly. Jesus was heading into Jerusalem

during Passover.

This was a major celebration everyone and their families would have been in town.

You know how Christmas there something is always going on. This would be much the same

The anticipation of the great miracle worker coming was immense.

II. The Reaction of the Pharisees Along with the people that were cheering for Jesus there were also the Pharisees.

These were worse than the opposing team fans.

They hated Jesus, they hated everything that he stood for.

They hated the fact that Jesus was getting more attention than they were.

They finally came up with the idea of saying that it is out of order and that Jesus should shut His disciples up.

Luke 19:39, Some of the Pharisees in the crowd said to Jesus.

"Teacher, rebuke your disciples."

Do we react the same way as the Pharisees?

We often get upset because something is happening and we are not a part of it.

We get an idea that if we are not a part of it then it is not worth it.

This is done out of jealousy. We cannot have jealousy; we all should be serving the same God.

We need to support these movements of God, no matter if we are involved or not.

That will make the body of Christ become what it is supposed to be rather than trying to hurt it all the time.

### III. The Response of Jesus

This is one of my favorite verses: Luke 19:40 "I tell you," He replied (JESUS) "if the keep quiet the stones will cry out."

Jesus is much wiser than the Pharisees.

Jesus is more powerful than they gave Him credit

He could use stones if he wanted to.

Are we going to let rocks do our job?

I do not want Jesus to resort to using stone to praise him.

That is my job.

It is more than a job it is a privilege and should be treated as such.

Why would you want a rock doing your job?

Imagine if your company decided that they did not need you anymore because they trained a Chimp to do your job.

You would be upset I am sure of it.

Now take it further and they said that all that you are is just a bunch of rocks, rocks are cheaper and easier to deal with.

Would that not make you mad? It would make me mad.

But if we do not do our job of praising the Lord that is what happens to us. Rocks would take our place.

Don't let that happen.

On the day we call Palm Sunday, in the triumphant entry the One who carries the brightness of God's glory descends from Bethany and the Mount of Olives and enters east gate of the holy city and went to the Temple.

This Easter season take a moment and reflect on what all God means to you.

This should motivate you to praise the Lord.

Not just some emotional motivation but a deeper praising of the God.

Do not quench something good that is happening, just because it is not your style.

Before you speak out against something make sure you have Biblical reasons what it is wrong.

Do not let rocks do your job. Praise The Lord!

This week consider it all... and choose to give it all to him...

A Prayer for Palm Sunday

King Jesus, you sit on the throne of heaven with nail marks in your hands and feet. You have defeated death and the power of sin, and yet we still experience pain and suffering. We declare that you are our King, and we are your people. We remember all that you have done and look forward to all that you will do. We eagerly await your next triumphal return, when you will make all things right. But until then, may your peace rule in our hearts. Amen.
