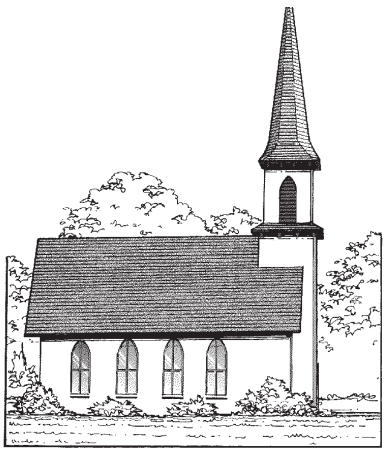

Bearcats Battle Fog, Rain, and the Clock in Busy Week of Competition

It was a tale of two weather days for the Bearcat Jr. High track and field program this week. Monday's meet in Bowman featured foggy, damp conditions throughout the day before rain forced officials to halt competition roughly two-thirds of the way through the girls 200 Meters. Thursday brought a complete turnaround as the team traveled to Hazen and competed under sunny skies, breezy but bright, delivering one of their strongest collective performances of the young season.

Bowman County Invite
Sophia Edmond had a stand-out performance of the day for the Bearcats, winning first place in the shot put and finishing second in the discus. Edmond also set personal records in both the 100 Meters and the 200 Meters before the rain arrived and halted the race. Kinsley Staiger added a third-place finish in the pole vault and s Alia Glasser placed fifth in the 200 Meters before the stoppage and finished seventh in the 1600 Meters. Alecana Torres placed seventh in the 200 Meters and seventh in the 1600 Meters as well. The girls 4x800 relay team of Glasser, KiAnna Staiger, Kinsley Staiger, and Torres rounded out the podium with a third-place finish.

Additionally, personal records on the girls side came from Isla Staiger in the 400 Meters, KiAnna Staiger in the 200 Meters, Morghan Coots in the 400 Meters, Melee Chasing Eagle in the 400 Meters, and Lydia Reaves in both the shot put and long jump.

On the boys side, personal records was the theme of the day, every Bearcat competitor left Bowman with at least one new best. Kerry Sako had the most complete outing, setting PRs in the 100 Meters, 400 Meters, and long jump. Simon Jacobson and Zayden Heck each posted new marks in the 100 and in their respective distance or sprint events. Carlo Martinez went PR in the 100 Meters and shot put. Lennox Elmer improved in the 100 and 400 Meters, and Westie Huck, Oliver Shellman, and Oliver Tutorow each picked up personal records in the 400 Meters and long jump respectively.

Hazen Invite

The April 16th meet at Hazen was the Bearcats' most complete showing of the week. In the 7th grade division, Kinsley Staiger opened competition with a first-place finish in the pole vault with a vault of 7 feet. The 7th grade boys relay teams were the story of the afternoon, the 4x100 squad of Carlo Martinez, Felix Dakken, Simon Jacobson, and Westie Hauck took second place, and the 4x400 team of Hauck, Jacobson, Zayden Heck, and Lennox Elmer also claimed silver. In the 1600 Meters, the Bearcats swept three of the top four spots: Jacobson placed second, Heck third, and Elmer fourth. Martinez rounded out the 7th grade boys results with a sixth-place finish in the 200 Meters and a fifth in the discus, while Heck also placed seventh in the 800 Meters. Personal records in the 7th grade came from Jacobson and Elmer in the long jump, Westie Hauck in the long jump, and from Olliver Shellman, Felix Dakken, and Jamison Comer in the 200 Meters, with Dakken also adding a shot put PR and Comer a discus PR. The 7th grade girls 4x100 relay team of Daxlynn Emter, Isla Staiger, Sophia Edmond, and Brynlee Meuchel finished eighth, while Annica Torres set a personal record in the discus.

In the 8th grade divisions, Sophia Edmond continued her dominant week by winning first place in the shot put and finishing sixth in the discus. Isla Staiger placed third in the pole vault, and Alia Glasser and Alecana Torres finished fourth and fifth respectively in the 800 Meters. The 8th grade girls 4x100 relay team of Kinsley Staiger, KiAnna Staiger, Morghan Coots, and Glasser placed eighth, while the 4x400 squad of Glasser, KiAnna Staiger, Isla Staiger, and Torres placed fourth. Personal records among the 8th grade girls went to Morghan Coots in the 100 Meters and 800 Meters, Melee Eagle Chasing in the 800 Meters, and Lydia Reaves in the shot put.

Among the 8th grade boys, Oliver Tutorow set a personal record in the 200 Meters, while Isaiah Foss and Kerry Sako each posted new bests in the 800 Meters. The 8th grade 4x100 relay team of Tutorow, Sako, Foss, and Olliver Shellman placed seventh, and the 4x400 squad of Foss, Shellman, Sako, and Tutorow rounded out the day with a fifth-place finish.

Street Project Public Hearing April 13, 2026

The public hearing was called to order by Mayor Doug Martwick at 7:00pm in the City Auditorium with the following council members present: Kevin Emter, Wayne Fitterer, Preston Foss, Brent Swanson and Chasty Wood. Absent: Wade Kottre.

Presenters: Jerod Klabunde & Anthony Setness from Moore Engineering Public Attendance: 76 community members

Project: 2027 Street Project Purpose: Public Input Mr. Klabunde gave a presentation about road conditions and repair/replacement options.

The project that was presented was for 27-30 blocks including some curb/gutter replacement and a chipseal project one year after the new asphalt is laid. This project would cost approximately 4.7 million dollars. The cost would be dependent on a low-cost loan through the Infrastructure Loan program with BND.

The cost would most likely be paid through special assessments with options including a sales tax increase or a water bill charge. At this time there is not a street improvement grant available.

Comments were made by the public which addressed the burden this project would place on fixed income residents. Most people would love new streets but were concerned that all people may not be able to afford a project of this size. Another concern was that in a few more years there will have to be another project to fix the rest of the poor streets.

People were asked to return comment cards with their opinions.

Spring Cleaning

Psalm 51:10 "Create in me a clean heart, O God, and renew a right spirit within me."

So, it is good to see the first signs of spring coming. After staying inside most of the season because of the cold temperatures, and the snow, houses here tend to get musty and dusty.

How many of you are ready for Spring? How many enjoy Spring Cleaning? Spring cleaning is a practice of opening our homes after winter, clearing out the clutter and refreshing what has grown dusty and stale. It feels good to clean our houses, garages, and closets and prepare for a new season.

In the same way our spiritual lives need regular "spring cleaning." Overtime, sin, unhealthy habits, and ungodly attitudes can quietly accumulate.

If left unattended, they hinder our relationship with God disrupt fellowship with others and drain our joy and spiritual vitality.

Spiritual decline rarely happens suddenly. It is a gradual process.

Little compromises lead to weakened devotion.

What once brought joy begins to feel like a burden.

Scripture repeatedly warns us to stay alert, guard our hearts, and live carefully.

The good news is that spiritual decay is reversible. By God's grace, restoration is always possible.

Whether we are already sensing spiritual clutter or simply wanting to prevent it, we all need intentional spiritual renewal. How do we practice spiritual spring cleaning?

I would like to focus on how this principle applies to spiritual life.

Because over time, if we are not careful, our lives can get cluttered up with the debris of sin.

Our minds and hearts can become encrusted with ungodly beliefs and attitudes. And that hinders our relationship with God. It hinders our friendship and fellowship with one another. It hinders our ability to experience joy, and peace, and power in the Christian life.

None of us is immune; we can't afford to go through life unconcerned with sin and holiness.

We must pay attention to our spiritual lives. We must examine how consistently we obey and devote ourselves to Christ.

Otherwise, the world will slowly shape how we think, speak, and act. If we're not careful, ungodly habits and attitudes will creep in.

What's tragic—and even frightening—is that we may not notice it happening.

Soon, thorns overtake us and our fellowship with God weakens.

The greatest danger is waking up too late and no longer caring.

This may be happening in your life—slowly, perhaps for some time.

But there is good news: spiritual decline can be reversed.

By God's grace, change is possible. If you're not facing this struggle, that's encouraging—but you still need to know how to prevent it.

In every case, we need spiritual "spring cleaning." Assess your walk with Christ: listen to God in His Word, then respond with obedience.

Let me give you some suggestions on how to go about it:

First, realize that help is available.

God has given us the Holy Spirit for this very purpose – to teach us, enlighten and when necessary, to convict us of sin.

He opens our eyes to see the debris and weeds in our lives that must be removed.

And here is part of the problem. When God sends others to confront us- a spouse, a friend, even an enemy – we often refuse to listen.

We shut them out, change the subject, attack the messenger, or walk away.

When all else fails, we rename sin to make it seem less sinful-or even virtuous- using pleasant-sounding interpretations.

Gossip becomes "sharing my concerns". Greed becomes "thriftiness".

Gluttony is excused as "a healthy appetite".

Pride is called "high self-esteem". Lying turns into "stretching the

truth".

A harsh, critical attitude is justified as having high standards.

You see the pattern. To truly hear God, you must be honest and willing to let Him reveal your sin.

Without sincerity, you will always find a way to avoid what He is saying.

Second, remember God's character.

God is a gentle, compassionate and loving. He reveals our sin carefully-never to crush us, but to lead us to repentance and healing

He knows our weaknesses and still loves us fully.

And because of that, he will not give me more than I can bear.

God shows us our sin and need for repentance little by little.

He knows all our flaws, and weaknesses, yet none of this surprises Him.

Despite it all, he continues to love, accept, and cherishes us.

Psalm 103:13-14

"As a father has compassion on his children, so the Lord has compassion on those who fear him; for he knows how we are formed, he remembers that we are dust."

Third, trust in God's complete forgiveness.

For those in Christ, there is no condemnation. Romans 8:1 "There is now no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus."

There is no possibility of discovering something that will cause God to withdraw his affection from me, or revoke my salvation, or renege on his promises.

Nothing I may learn about myself can in any way alter my relationship with God.

Our sins – past, present, and future – are fully paid for through Jesus.

Nothing we discover about ourselves can separate us from God's love.

That means I do not have to deny them or try to hide them, either from God or from myself.

What an exciting sense of freedom that it brings!

Now, do we really need the Holy Spirit to reveal our sin to us? Yes. He can speak to us through various means – through a sermon, or a book, or a friend's counsel; and certainly, through the Scriptures – but for us to hear his voice, it is essential that we pray and ask for the Spirit to open our eyes.

Why? Because we have a great capacity for self-deception.

We cannot trust ourselves to be objective about our own motives and actions; we naturally see ourselves in the best light.

Like unnoticed clutter in our homes, our lives also need God's help to reveal what we overlook.

Through the Holy Spirit, we can see ourselves as God sees us-and change.

So – what do you do when God answers your prayer, and begins to open your eyes to some area of your life that needs to change?

Our first reaction is to look away, because we do not like what we see.

It used to feel easier—back when we could overlook the dirty windows, the worn rug, and the cluttered garage.

We liked believing everything was fine, because it spared us the hard work of cleaning up and changing. And when God shows us what needs to change, the temptation is still to look away.

Many people respond this way when the Holy Spirit reveals God's Word to their lives.

Or when they hear a sermon that exposes an area of their life that needs change.

They close their Bible, or they leave the service and quickly forget what God was saying to them.

How foolish! What does James tell us?

The one who hears God's word, and receives and acts on it will be blessed.it, and who does what it says – that person will be blessed.

Why not decide today that you will be that kind of person, so that you will receive the blessing that has been promised here?

Blessings come not from hearing alone, but from obedience.

Gracious Father, by Your mercy help us lay down whatever hinders our walk with Christ. Draw us close to Him, soften our hearts, and strengthen us by Your Spirit to live faithfully—today and in the days ahead. In Jesus' name, amen.
