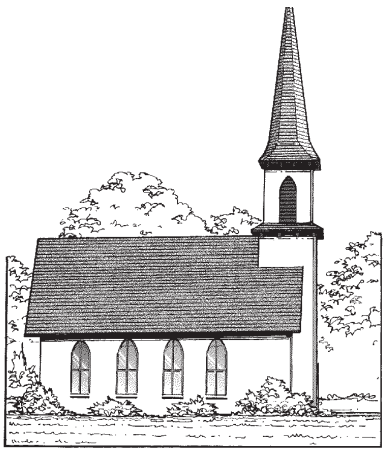

GU Saddle Club to Hall of Fame *continued from front page.*



Morton County Sheriff's Posse – GU Branch – In the late 1970's the Saddle Club was asked if they would help form a Glen Ullin branch of the Morton County Sheriff's Posse. Members varied over the years, but they helped with Security and Search-n-Rescue for the county. Members would often ride in local parades, including this one at the Labor Day Parade in Almont. Rodeo Princess – Chantel (Staiger) Kobilansky is a native of Glen Ullin and grew up competing in the Saddle Club rodeo events. But in 2008 she took a different avenue. Through an interview and horsemanship contest, she competed for and won the title of Mandan Rodeo Princess! She spent the next year representing the sport of rodeo. Among her many opportunities, she led the Saddle Club by carrying the American Flag in the Glen Ullin Fall Festival Parade (riding Bugs) along with her dad, Marlyn Staiger (riding Snickers) carrying the Glen Ullin Saddle Club Flag.



Team Roping – Russell Schirado and Casey (Schirado) Ward Team Roping at the USTRC (US Team Roping Championship) in Kansas. Russell (Heeling on Angel) and daughter, Casey, (Heading on Lute) both grew up riding, roping, and competing in a multitude of rodeo events. Russell's love of Team Roping led him to compete in the NDRA and Roughrider Rodeo Circuits early on before focusing on the USTRC which led him to the Championship Finals in Oklahoma as well as the World Series of Team Roping which is held in Las Vegas, NV. While a hand at team roping, Casey prefers Breakaway Calf Roping. She and her horse, Slider, competed in the NDRA and made it to the finals of the Roughrider Rodeo Circuit. Russell and Casey both continue to compete in individual roping competitions.

for the FFA organization at school. The club continued to ride in the Fall Festival parade as long as it was held and offered horse and pony rides. Also, starting in the late 1970s, the Saddle Club was contacted to form a Glen Ullin branch of the Morton County Sheriff's Posse. A variety of members served the county in this capacity for approximately 25 years.

By 1999, the old Glen Ullin arena was torn down and a new one made of metal panels was constructed north of the RR tracks, across from the golf course. A new concession stand and a Crow's Nest were also included so events could continue to be held yearly.

Today, the Glen Ullin Saddle Club – currently at 35 families – remains a part of the Stark-Morton Saddle Club Association (started in the early 1960s) along with Richardton, Hebron, and New Salem. Current officers include: President – Marlyn Staiger, Vice President – Bruce Morman, Secretary – Nancy Morman, Treasurer – Darla Becker, and Directors – Curt Kobilansky and Lynnette Schirado. The club continues to sponsor events at the arena and holds a rodeo event every year, although the broncs and bulls have disappeared. Today's rodeo is more "family friendly," consisting of 27 events from calf and steer riding, calf and team roping, goat tying, poles and barrels, to games like Rescue Race, Musical Chairs, and even the old Sack Race.

From all this groundwork, many members went on to compete and excel at higher levels like the ND High School Rodeo, College Rodeo, NDRA, Regional Rodeo Circuits, PRCA, as well as national and regional level competitions specifically in Team Roping, Steer Wrestling, Breakaway Calf Roping, and Barrel Racing. One of the truly unique things about the club is that you see some members who are children, grandchildren and even great-grandchildren of previous members. While the membership and the activities it offers may fluctuate, it's an organization that continues to hold to its original premise – celebrating the love of horses!

ANALYSIS OF THE STATEWIDE MEASURES APPEARING ON THE ELECTION BALLOT JUNE 9, 2026

The following analysis is for the measure appearing on the statewide Primary Election ballot on June 9, 2026. This publication is required by section 16.1-01-07 of the North Dakota Century Code to enable voters to become familiar with the effect of proposed measures. The full text of each measure is available on the Office of the Secretary of State's website at vote.nd.gov or by requesting a copy from the Elections Division at 701-328-4146, or from the office of any County Auditor.

In addition, as required by section 16.1-01-17 of the North Dakota Century Code, a copy of the Legislative Council's report on the estimated fiscal impact of initiated Measures No. 1 is available on the Office of the Secretary of State's website at vote.nd.gov, by phone at 701-328-4146, by email at sosomelect@nd.gov, or by letter to Secretary of State, 600 E Boulevard Avenue Dept 108, Bismarck ND 58505-0500.

Analysis of Initiated Constitutional Measure No. 1 (Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 4007, 2025 Session Laws, Ch. 615)

Initiated Constitutional Measure No. 1 was placed on the ballot by action of the 2025 North Dakota Legislative Assembly with passage of Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 4007 (2025 Session Laws, Chapter 610). If approved, this constitutional measure would amend and reenact section 9 of article III and section 16 of article IV of the Constitution of North Dakota, relating to requiring each resolution adopted by the legislative assembly proposing a constitutional amendment and each initiative petition and measure proposing a constitutional amendment be comprised of a single subject. The proposed amendment would require constitutional amendments to be limited to one subject. The Secretary of State shall not approve an initiative petition for circulation if the Secretary determines that the proposed amendment comprises more than one subject. Additionally, the legislative assembly is required to limit proposed amendments to the constitution to one subject.

The estimated fiscal impact of this measure is none.

Voting "YES" means you approve the measure summarized above. Voting "NO" means you reject the measure summarized above.

Staying Connected to Christ
John 15:4-5

God did not call us to wander. He did not call us to drift. He called us to live with holy purpose, and that only happens when we stay connected to Jesus and full of the Holy Ghost.

If we drift, we grow weak. If we drift, we lose fire. But when we seek God on purpose, the Holy Ghost gives us strength to stand, power to endure, and boldness to obey.

Today's message is simple, but it is burning in my spirit: stay close to God, stay full of the Spirit, and live on purpose.

Living on purpose means living each day God's way instead of just going through the motions.

It means using your time, choices, and relationships to honor God.

Here is the conviction that rises in us about intentional living: An intentional life is anchored in purpose and carried forward with bold, steady determination until God-given vision becomes a lived reality.

In short, it means building your life around God's will.

A life lived on purpose has direction and self-control.

If we do not live on purpose, pressure, fear, and distraction will lead us.

But God did not call us to be ruled by chaos. He called us to live by faith.

Our scripture today is John 15:4-5. Jesus says to His disciples:

"Remain in me, and I will remain in you. No branch can bear fruit by itself; it must remain in the vine. Neither can you bear fruit unless you remain in me. I am the vine; you are the branches. If a man remains in me and I in him, he will bear much fruit; apart from me, you can do nothing."

Jesus is not giving a weak suggestion. He is laying down the law of the Spirit for a fruitful life. He says, "remain in Me."

Stay connected. Stay rooted. Stay full. Do not let go.

Three marks of this kind of life: Love God and people, guard how you live, and follow God's leading every day.

Staying close to God sounds simple, but it is a real battle when life is heavy, loud, and relentless and the enemy would love nothing more than to wear you down and drain your oil.

If we are not watchful, we can sit in church, hear sermons, sing songs, lift our hands, and still drift from Christ.

God calls us to be in world, but not to become like the world.

Jesus has not moved. He is still speaking. He is still calling. He is still healing. He is still delivering. He is still able. We are the ones who must seek Him and stay nearby.

Like any strong relationship, walking with Christ takes love, time, and attention.

So, the call is clear: stay connected through prayer, God's Word, obedience, and the power of the Holy Ghost. That is where strength is built. That is where fire is kept. That is where anointing flows.

When we stay in Jesus, He produces in us what effort cannot produce, what talent cannot fake, and what dead religion can never manufacture.

Apart from Him, we can do nothing that lasts.

But when we stay in Jesus, our lives begin to show His power, His fruit, and His presence.

It all begins with prayer.

Prayer is not a dry habit. Prayer is where chains break, burdens lift, hearts are strengthened, and weary souls are filled again in the presence of God.

Wherever prayer happens, God hears and draws near.

Many are tired, worn down, and running on empty, but the strength of

God has not run dry.

Drift often happens little by little through distraction, delay, and neglect.

A missed prayer, a neglected quiet time, or an ignored conviction can slowly choke the fire and grieve the Spirit of God in us.

Jesus must be Lord over every part of life.

We will never stand strong while keeping parts of our hearts closed to Him.

God is calling us higher, deeper, and closer.

This is not the hour to play church.

This is the hour to pray through, press in, and burn for God.

Jesus is the true Vine, and everything we need is in Him.

Real fruit comes from abiding in Jesus, not from our own effort.

Jesus wants every part of our lives, not just one part.

Lord, do not let us hide inside the church while people outside are broken, lost, bound, and desperate for a move of God.

Our daily lives are mission fields.

This is the time to wake up, speak up, rise up, and walk in the power of the Holy Ghost.

Do not be ashamed of Jesus. Tell what He has done. Lift up His name and let your life preach under the anointing of the Holy Ghost.

Real Christianity does not stay safe and comfortable.

It moves toward the hurting, the weary, the bound, and the overlooked.

Ministry happens when we step into people's pain, carry the presence of God, and point them to Jesus.

When broken people come, we should make room, pray, and love them well.

This is living on purpose: stay close to Christ, stay full of the Spirit, love people deeply, and bear fruit that lasts.

Jesus said, "Remain in me, and I will remain in you."

To abide means to stay close to Him.

We abide by making time for prayer, worship, God's Word, obedience, and yielding to the Holy Ghost.

Conclusion:

John 15 gives us both a warning and a promise: apart from Jesus we can do nothing, but if we remain in Him and stay full of the Spirit, we will bear fruit that lasts.

Everything we need flows from Him!

Jesus is the vine and we are the branches. If we stay in Him, we will bear fruit.

He is the center, the source, and the sustaining power from which life, strength, and spiritual growth flow.

If we disconnect from Him, we dry up. But mercy is still reaching for us, and we can return to Him today.

So, seek Him now, stay near, and let the Holy Ghost set your heart on fire again.

Christian living on purpose is a daily choice to walk with God.

Start today. Come back now. Do not wait. Let God revive your life right now!

We must hunger for His presence to remain in Him.

PRAY THROUGH UNTIL THE POWER OF GOD FALLS!

"Lord Jesus, thank You for Your constant presence in my life. I want to remain deeply rooted in You. Please quiet my mind, remove distractions, and help me to fix my eyes on Your love. Fill me with Your Holy Spirit so that my thoughts, words, and actions reflect Your grace. Teach me to abide in You, trusting that You are my strength, my refuge, and my guide through every season. In Your holy name, Amen."
