COURTHOUSE

From 1 entire structure. It was covered by brick walls; and the partitions are of tile. Italian marble is used for walls in the rotunda and on the stairways, trimmed with Belgian marble. In other parts of the building domestic marble from Vermont, Tennessee, Georgia, Alabama and other states has been used. Facing the building on the Fifth Street side is a paving brick terrace over 160 feet in length and nearly 40 feet wide. Granite steps lead down from the court house to the terrace and from the terrace to the street. Sidewalks completely encircle the building, and two walks lead from the semi-circular walk in front of the sidewalk to Fifth street. A flag pole base has been constructed in front of the terrace on which an American flag will fly. A parking space, cement-paved, is in the rear of the building and will accommodate over 50 cars. Going into the court house from the north entrance on the left in the corridor is the bronze plate bearing the names of the officers of the county, and the history of the building. It was authorized by the county commissioners by a resolution of September 1924, the cornerstone was laid August, 1925, and only a few details are left for the completion of the building. The bids had been called for April 30, and the contract let May 1.
