Ordinances for Publication - THC 9.27.020 - Prohibited acts - Penalties.
It is unlawful for any person to willfully, as defined in N.D.C.C. Section 12.1-02-02, possess tetrahydrocannabinol or a tetrahydrocannabinol analog unless the substance was obtained directly from, or pursuant to, a valid prescription or order of a practitioner while acting in the course of the practitioner's professional practice. A person who violates this Section by possessing tetrahydrocannabinol or a tetrahydrocannabinol analog in an amount less than two grams is guilty of an infraction unless the provisions of NDCC 12.1-32-01(7) apply. A person who violates this Section by possessing at least two grams but not more than six grams of tetrahydrocannabinol or a tetrahydrocannabinol analog is guilty of a class B misdemeanor.
9.30.010 - Unlawful possession of drug paraphernalia.

LEGALS

A person may not use or possess with intent to use drug paraphernalia to process, prepare, test, analyze, pack, repack, store, contain, conceal, inject, ingest, inhale, or otherwise introduce into the human body marijuana, marijuana derivatives, or tetrahydrocannabinol or possess with the intent to use drug paraphernalia to store or contain marijuana, marijuana derivatives, or tetrahydrocannabinol in violation of chapter 9.27. A person violating this section is guilty of an infraction.

Today in History: June 4, the Tiananmen Square Massacre

Today is Thursday, June 4, the 155th day of 2026. There are 210 days left in the year.

Today in history:
On June 4, 1989, hundreds, perhaps thousands, of pro-democracy demonstrators and dozens of soldiers are estimated to have been killed when Chinese troops crushed a seven-week-long protest by demonstrators occupying Beijing's Tiananmen Square.

Also on this date:
In 1812, the U.S. House of Representatives passed its first declaration of war against Britain, approving the measure by a vote of 79-49.

In 1919, Congress approved the 19th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, which said that the right of Americans to vote "shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of sex." (The amendment was then sent to the states for ratification.)

In 1940, during World War II, the Allied military

completed the evacuation of more than 338,000 troops from Dunkirk, France.

Also in 1940, British Prime Minister Winston Churchill declared in a speech to the House of Commons: "We shall fight on the beaches, we shall fight on the landing grounds, we shall fight in the fields and in the streets, we shall fight in the hills; we shall never surrender."

In 1942, the World War II naval Battle of Midway began, which resulted in a decisive American victory against Japan and marked a turning point in the war in

the Pacific.
In 1986, Jonathan Jay Pollard, a former U.S. Navy intelligence analyst, pleaded guilty in Washington to conspiring to deliver national defense information to Israel. (Sentenced to life in prison, Pollard would be released on parole in November 2015.)

In 1990, Dr. Jack Kevorkian carried out his first publicly assisted suicide, helping Janet Adkins, a 54-year-old Alzheimer's patient from Portland, Oregon, end her life in Oakland County, Michigan. (Kevorkian died in 2011.)

Kathy Frelich was born in Fargo, N.D. Her dad came to N.D. to attend college and to play hockey for UND. "They taught me you can do anything," she recalled. That's how she ended up running for office in the first place.

Her parents were from Canada. She was raised in Winnipeg, Manitoba but moved to the Lake Region in 1987 to attend Lake Region State College and met her husband, Michael, who lived in rural Crary. They have been married 34 years, have three daughters and six grandchildren.

"I love the Lake Region," Frelich stated adding, "I'm a public servant and this is important work."

Frelich says it is very important to provide information to people so they know what is going on around the region. She says that is at the heart of her work in the legislature. She adds that as a farmer's wife, she understands the situation many of the farmers around Devils Lake experience with flooding and inundated property. Nothing is simple about it. She says that's why she got on the Ag Water Committee as they study the roads and farmland impacted by over 30 years of flooding in the Devils Lake Basin and beyond.

Another concern she wishes to continue to study, if she is re-elected, is the Lake Region Law Enforcement Center and finding the funding assistance in loans or grants available to help the community.
