**NOTICE OF ZONING AMENDMENT**  
14.0304-Floodplain Management.

Pursuant to N.D.C.C. Section 40-47-04(2), the City of ENDERLIN hereby gives notice that zoning regulations in the form of amended zoning ordinances to the floodplain management within the city, set forth in Ordinance 14.0304 have been amended and adopted after a public hearing that was, after proper notice by publication, held on the 2nd day of March, 2026 at 7:00 p.m. at City Hall located at 411 Railway, ENDERLIN, ND 58027. The property involved includes the entire area of the City of ENDERLIN zoned in all zoning categories for areas that fall within the special flood hazard areas shown in the Federal Emergency Management Agency published Flood Insurance Study for the City of ENDERLIN, dated January 19, 2011 as overlaid onto the zoning map of ENDERLIN and its additions located at City Hall. The nature, scope and purposes of the proposed changes were to come into compliance with federal FEMA requirements for qualification of property owners to qualify for purchase of flood insurance. The zoning amendments (amended ordinance Section 14.0304) are available for public inspections during the City's regular business hours at the auditor's office at 411 Railway, ENDERLIN, ND 58027.

Unoccupied fish houses must be removed from all waters beginning March 15.

Fish houses may be used after March 15 if they are removed daily.

In addition, anglers are encouraged to look around and clean up the site if any trash is found left behind.

**Elk, Moose, Bighorn Sheep Applications Online**



Elk, moose and bighorn sheep applications are available online at the North Dakota Game and Fish Department's website, [gf.nd.gov](http://gf.nd.gov). The application deadline is March 25.

A total of 1,062 elk licenses are available to hunters this fall, an increase of 102 from last year.

A total of 296 moose licenses are available, which remains the same as last year.

A bighorn sheep hunting season is tentatively scheduled for 2026, depending on the sheep population. The status of the bighorn sheep season will be determined Sept. 1, after summer population surveys.

Bighorn sheep applicants must apply for a license at the same time as moose and elk, but not for a specific unit. Once total licenses are determined for each unit in late summer, the bighorn lottery will be held and successful applicants will be contacted to select a hunting unit.

Because the bighorn sheep application fee is not refundable as per state law, if a bighorn season is not held, applicants would not receive a refund.

Elk, moose and bighorn sheep lottery licenses are issued as once-in-a-lifetime licenses in North Dakota. Hunters who have received a license through the lottery are not eligible to apply for that species again.

**Are heart attacks from shoveling snow common?**

Yes.

Heart attacks while shoveling snow are a well-documented risk. Men with underlying heart disease, high blood pressure, diabetes or low fitness are especially vulnerable. The American Heart Association says exertion from shoveling snow, especially in cold weather, can increase the risk of a heart attack. Cold constricts blood vessels, raises blood pressure and can stress the heart when combined with strenuous activity. A scientific review published in the Canadian Medical Association Journal found that heavy snowstorms correlate with a 16% higher risk of heart attacks and a 34% higher risk of heart attack-related deaths in men. Women had a much lower risk elevation — 1% and 4%, respectively. The National Safety Council says snow shoveling leads to thousands of injuries and as many as 100 deaths nationwide each year. The NSC recommends taking it slow, using a smaller shovel, pushing snow rather than lifting it, and calling 911 if heart attack symptoms occur.
