September Burro returns

The Hillsboro Burros statue that had been a fixture in Hillsboro's Railroad Park for nearly 40 years – before being removed for repairs – was returned to the park on Sept. 1.

"I think it looks really good. It's great to have it back," Hillsboro City Commission President Levi Reese said following the installation of the repaired burro statue.

Cruising along

The 33rd annual Cruise to the Island car show packed in large crowds on Sunday, Sept. 10.

Organizers said the show and shine pulled in 488 registered vehicles, the second-largest turnout the car show had seen in its 33-year history following a record 516 the previous year.

Shining Lights

Dera Benson-Johnson, owner of the Shining Lights Children's Program in Hillsboro, announced in September that the child care provider would be moving to a new location.

Benson-Johnson said the child care center was leaving its home inside the former Dakota Heritage Bank building along Caledonia Avenue for new digs along First Avenue Southwest starting in November.

Shelter deal

Representatives from the Circle of Friends Animal Shelter in Grand Forks agreed to provide boarding services for stray dogs picked up by the Traill County Sheriff's Department.

Sheriff Steve Hunt told the Hillsboro City Commission on Sept. 15 that the animal shelter which previously had been reluctant to take in loose dogs from outside Grand Forks County – had changed its stance and approved working with Traill County authorities on a trial ba-

Dairy permit

The North Dakota Department of Environmental Quality in September approved a permit for Riverview LLC's Herberg Dairy southeast of Hillsboro.

The permit cleared the way to start construction of the planned 25,000-cow dairy operation, which would become the largest in the state of North Dakota once complete.

October

Tunseth award

Frannie Tunseth received a rousing ovation from her fellow MayPort-CG teachers and middle and high school students after being named North Dakota's 2026 teacher of the year.

Supporters held a small ceremony at the school after Tunseth was named teacher of the year during a public presentation Sept. 26 in Bismarck.

"This recognition may have my name on it, but it really belongs to each and every one of you. You guys are the reasons why all of us teachers show up every single day," Tunseth told MPCG students.

Fire station

Construction crews broke ground in early October on Hillsboro Fire & Rescue's new \$4 million fire station being built south of the Hillsboro city armory along Highway 81.

Firefighters, city officials and representatives from Sanford Health gathered near the building site armed with a half-dozen shovels for a ground-breaking ceremony.

Hillsboro Fire Chief Jake Rust said the project kicked off slightly behind schedule, although firefighters still expect to have the building finished next summer, he said.

Chicken ban

The Hatton City Council on Oct. 1 pushed back its previously approved Jan. 1, 2026 deadline requiring residents to remove their chicken flocks from inside city limits.

Following impassioned pleas from more than a half-dozen people, city leaders approved a new May 1, 2026 deadline for people to close down their coops in the city.

Mayor Stu Letcher said he sympathized with people who shared their feelings about their personal flocks but pointed out the city's ordinances have never allowed chickens, ducks or other livestock inside city limits.

Haugen retires

After spending more than three and a half decades in the Traill County Auditor's Office – the past nine as county auditor Glenda Haugen was preparing to shuffle into retirement in late October.

The 67-year-old Portland, N.D., woman said she was ready to spend more time with family and close the book on her 36year career in county govern-

She was hired as a deputy in the county auditor's office on June 26, 1989.

Brewery sale

The Hillsboro Economic Development Corp. on Oct. 27 extended a three-year, \$60,000 loan offer to Brian Gullickson, who was in negotiations to purchase Goose River Brewing in Hillsboro.

The forgivable loan would be converted into a grant as long as Gullickson kept the downtown brewpub in operation for three years following the purchase of the establishment. Gullickson, who lives in

Moorhead, Minn., owns six bar and grill establishments in east-

ern North Dakota.

Blooming business

Brittany Thompson of Hillsboro announced in late October that she was opening Heavenly Blooms & More at 5 N. Main St. in downtown Hillsboro.

Thompson said the business would offer customers fresh, hand-crafted floral arrangements when it opened in early Novem-

"It's been a dream of mine forever to own my own little boutique flower shop," Thompson said.

November Elevator fire

More than 100 firefighters from 16 fire departments in Traill, Steele and Grand Forks counties camped out along Railroad Avenue in Hatton late Nov. 5 to battle a grain elevator fire.

The fire at Anchor Ingredients' grain-handling facility at 120 Railroad Ave., was reported around 3:30 p.m. Wednesday, Nov. 5. Smoke from the fire could be seen from 40 miles away in Hillsboro.

Two buildings were destroyed in the blaze and fire officials said they believed the structures were filled with wheat from fall harvest prior to the fire.

Lofty goals

Paul and Terra Provost of Halstad, Minn., opened the Hayloft Mercantile in Hillsboro in November.
